
HOME STREET HOME

Home Street Home (HSH) is a non-profit organization located in Makongeni village, Kwale County, Kenya. It was founded in 2014 and registered in Finland (2014), in Kenya (2015) and in Switzerland (2020). The organization runs projects in the area of Kwale County with the main aim to empower and support children, youth, and families in distress.

The main project of the organization is HSH Center. HSH Center is located in Makongeni village and it's the heart of the organization. HSH Center includes training center for girls, playgroup for 3-year-old children, community health clinic, library and soon to be opened, day care for children with special needs. In addition, Home Street Home organizes trainings and workshops, runs porridge program in local kindergartens and aims to support the local community through its other projects and activities.

HSH team is in charge of the implementation of the projects and programs of HSH. HSH Team includes HSH board, employees, local and international volunteers, interns, and local experts. Everyone has their own role and place in HSH family.

Home Street Home is collecting its funds mainly from Finland and from Switzerland. In both of the countries, fundraising is accomplished voluntarily through different fundraising activities such as charity events and product selling.



ON THE SIDE OF THE CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

As United Nations states, every child has a right to health, education, family life, play and recreation, an adequate standard of living and to be protected from abuse and harm. However, too often the potential of children is undervalued and yet still, millions of children grow up insecurity or excluded from receiving the most basic and essential health, educational, and developmental services.

Successful communities invest their children and protect their rights. It is proven that early investments in children's health, education, and development have benefits that carry on throughout the person's lifetime and society as a whole.

Home Street Home stands on the side of the children. We work to ensure the development in favor of children. We are committed to help children to enjoy life in all its fullness. Our work with families, communities and partners strives to improve the well-being of vulnerable children, in the most important aspects of their lives. We are working to improve the behaviours of community and family members towards children. We want to see society where children are valued, and their rights are respected unconditionally.

It said that inequality starts at birth, but poverty attacks and affects children before they're even born. That's why our attention to the child starts when he or she is in womb and continues until the end of the education journey. We give special attention for the most vulnerable and often marginalized groups of the society. For example, children with disabilities are among the most vulnerable and excluded groups in the world. Labelling, neglect, and stereotyping are some of the social barriers that children with disabilities and their families face in society.

All children have equal rights to care and protection, and to live a healthy life free from abuse and harm. We are here to play our role in this and do our best in our little circle, in Makongeni.

ON THE JOURNEY OF CHANGE

Development is a constant process that brings change. It creates growth and brings progress. It is necessary and useful, positive change that our world and different societies needs. Home Street Home aims to support the development, the positive change, in its working area. We want to do our part to support the implementation of sustainable development goals and push the development ahead.

We are learning more every day through our internal project evaluation, impact assessments and even more, through the world around us: world changes every day, and it influences our work. It helps us to work smarter and more effectively.

Government of Kenya is constantly doing its best to improve the quality of life and hundreds of organizations in our area, are bringing their input to the table. Over the past 8 years, our village, Makongeni, has changed massively: new buildings, better infrastructure, more services available and people's wellbeing and health has significantly improved. This proves, that change is happening — every day. We want to be part of the change and contribute positively to the development of the area.

As an organization, we believe that our role is to support the community in the change and development. We can fill those gaps that other parties cannot reach. We can create stability and provide services. However, we need to be open for change and ready to develop our systems, methods and thinking. Since world its not the same, we shouldn't be either.

This means, that at every turn we take, we need to evaluate our work critically and analyze the changing socio-economic environment, government policies, laws, and structures around us.

FINDING THE RIGHT WAY TO HELP

Since establishing the organization, we have been actively searching the answer to a simple question: what is the right way to help? This might seem like simple question, but while looking deeper into it, you can realize that it is much more complex than it might seem.

Home Street Home was founded with the ideology of helping others. Somewhere far behind, there was the moment, where the founders decided: let's do this, to help the needy ones. That's how it all begun. Helping others, makes people feel good. It makes us feel good that we have contributed to someone's wellbeing and helped make their world a better place.

Helping people is not always simple. After helping people for years through different projects and programs, we have faced the problematic side of help: both for us and for the person we've helped. When we effectively help someone to solve their problem, they may learn one thing: that we are good at solving their problems for them. That means that in future, when they have problems, they come to us again and again, never learning to solve their own issues, and instead depending on us to do it for them. This is called dependency syndrome.

To fight against this problematic circle, we have slowly transformed our work into different direction: Instead of helping people in personal level, directly, we have focused our minds on providing services and expertise in the community level. For instance, we have opened a health clinic, we are running a training center and providing breakfast porridge in the local pre-primary schools. It is our way of stepping away from the dependency syndrome.

Through this process of searching the right and wrong, we have come to the place where we are today. It is influencing our decision making and all choices we have made, to move forward with our organization. However, we cannot say, that we have found the ultimate right way to help. It is constantly developing while our organization is growing, our team is gaining more expertise and the community around us is developing.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR 2022



CLINIC EXTENSION

Our year started with thrive: we received endyear donation from company in Finland. This donation enabled us to continue our work with the clinic building. Between January and June, our team finalized our new clinic extension room. This brought us important extra space.

PLAYGROUP UNIFORMS

On May, our team designed new uniforms for our HSH Children's Playgroup kids. These brownand yellow-colored uniforms are now working as an identification to our playgroup children.





KTC LUNCH PROGRAM

Between February and May, our team made massive steps and constructed an extension to our kitchen. On June, our extension was finally ready and we were able to start our new lunch program. KTC Lunch program provides lunch every day for all our students and staff members. Through the program, we can ensure our students are learning with filled stomachs and high energy level throughout the day. It is simple solution for simple but highly affecting problem.

GARDEN & CHICKEN HOUSE

Since the food price inflation has affected the prices, we looked for different options of how to sustain our lunch program. As a simple solution, we build a chicken house and cleared a new vegetable garden area to our center. Now we are able to produce our own eggs and vegetables.



HSH DAY CARE CENTER

Since the beginning of the year, we took massive steps with our daycare project. Our volunteers and local experts worked hard to ensure the continuality of the construction. We continued finishing the building and by end of the year, there were only final steps left before furnishing.

HSH CONTAINER

In fall 2021 we collected material donations from Finland. By end of the year, all the donations were sorted, listed and packed, which allowed us to start the paperwork in Kenyan side in January 2022. Finally, on June, all the papers were finished and finally our container started its journey from Finland to Kenya. In September, we offloaded the container in our center, in Makongeni.



YEAR OF DEVELOPMENT

Year 2022 started with high hopes: two very uncertain pandemic years were behind and finally it looked like we would get more stable and normal year ahead of us. Little did we know. In March Russia attached Ukraine. In one night, world changed. In the next few weeks, we started to get a hint of the massive impact of the war. Our fundraising and donations dropped, prices started to get higher and world was in another unexpected crisis.

During April and May we needed to make hard decisions: sudden drop in the donations affected us intensely and we needed to think, how we can support the projects that are normally run by regular fundraising and donations. Where should we focus our attention? This time we were able to adjust faster, since we had learned a lot from the pandemic years. We quickly slowed down our work and evaluated the situation and its affects.

Same time, we went through discussions of how to improve the help we were giving. For long time, we have wanted to do something to get away from dependency syndrome. We wanted to focus on systems and solutions, rather than making people to be dependent on us. Easy thing to say, but harder to execute while we have been supporting some of our families for years. This was a long process of brainstorming, discussing, and planning – to find the right direction to go. Through the process, we kept learning, developing our systems and searching new ways to find stability to the organization – and its beneficiaries.

In October we celebrated Home Street Home's 8th birthday and it reminded us how far we have came from and how essential it is, to keep looking for ways to improve. While the year was another unexpected crise, we are still proud of every single step we made: we took massive steps in the construction of day care, we served over 6800 patients in our clinic and 139 student graduated from our training center. We organized maternity workshops, sexual education classes and served breakfast porridge for 280 children every single school morning.

Also, our team went through another massive year of growth, and we are extremely proud how our members have gained new skills, found solutions to long-term problems, and improved the projects in general. For instance, our team leaders took great steps and improved their leadership skills and project leading system. In addition, we were happy to welcome new team members and grow as a HSH family.

It has been great to realize how much our team has grown during the year. Our team gained new skills, expertise, and knowledge. Even though we faced financial difficulties and worried world crises, our center was full of smiley faces and joy through out the year. When news were too hard to read, there was always our great team lifting spirit up.

We are hoping to face less uncertain and more stable next year of 2023. After years of pandemic and global rollercoaster, we are ready to focus on stability. Focus on the development and reaching to greater results.

PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS OF 2022

PART 1: HSH CENTER

HSH CENTER

Home Street Home's primary goal has been to have our own rescue center in Makongeni village. For the last 8 years we have made huge steps towards achieving this goal. However, during these years lot has changed. Our village has changed, the area has developed, and we have learned more. Our understanding of the need and deeper challenges has increased. We have learned what works and what doesn't. – And what kind of projects are having the biggest impact.

Over the last two years, our minds have been focusing a lot on sustainability and stepping away from harmful dependency syndrome. It has been an important process to fully analyze and evaluate the direction of the organization. Through our consultative meetings we agreed to focus on improving the services that we are offering at the center and make them better. With these changes we have therefore changed the name from HSH Rescue Center to HSH Center. This means, that we have decided to not to continue with the rescue center -plan, but we will focus on the services and projects that we feel and believe are having the greatest impact in long-term development.

HSH Center combines the most needed services and high-quality expertise. It includes training center for girls, health care facility, playgroup for 3 years old children, library & study room services and day care for children with disabilities. During the year of 2022, with the help of our volunteers, we have focused on construction and improving the existing building structures. We accomplished clinic extension, kitchen extension, and our day care is on the finishing line.





HSH HEALTH CLINIC

HSH Health Clinic was opened in April 2020. The aim of the project is to provide high quality outpatient services for the most vulnerable families in Makongeni village and nearby areas. We are targeting especially the ones who are living in extreme poverty and are most often not accessing public health care services. Our clinic serves people from Monday to Friday at 8am to 4pm.

Our clinic is led by local health professional, Cecilia. Cecilia is a qualified clinical officer. She has been working in private hospitals over 3 years postgraduation. Her specialty is children and pediatrics. She also has high knowledge of the needs and challenges in rural areas.



IMPACT

Our project is giving direct and strong impact to the community around us. Every day we are serving the people and assisting the needy ones. The care and treatment itself, is giving a huge positive impact. Bringing good-quality care, guidance, and counselling inside the community is supporting the long-term development. Through the guidance and the constant health education we can prevent diseases and improve the wellbeing of the people.

During January – December 2022 we served total 6865 patients. From the total number of patients, 2344 patients were under 5 years old and 2377 under 18 years old.

CLINIC EXTENSION


In December 2021 we received on-time donation from company in Finland. The company donated 4000€ to the HSH Health Clinic project, with the aim to build an extension room to the clinic. Immediately in January, we started the construction of the new clinic extension. The new extension will include material storage, wound care station and two observation beds.

During the year, we finished the construction and started to make furniture. In addition, we received large amount of medical equipment as a donation from Finland. This included hospital beds to the new extension.

The target is to officially open the extension by beginning of 2023.

HSH CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUP

HSH Children's Playgroup is targeted to 3-year-old children, who are supposed to join kindergarten in the following school year. The aim of the program is to provide high-quality early childhood education and support to children. In our playgroup, children are learning important skills, such as language skills, numbers, motoric skills, and groupwork skills. They are learning how to follow orders, how to play together and how to color, paint and connect dots. They are singing, dancing, playing, and doing arts and crafts.

Our playgroup program runs every day from morning up to midday. During break-time, the kids are getting cup of porridge and enjoying fresh air outside. The program is led by early childhood education teacher, Priscilla. Priscilla is experienced and skilled teacher, who has long-term experience working as a kindergarten teacher.


Priscilla is running the program together with her assistant, Mariam, and HSH volunteers and social service interns. So far, we have heard a lot of positive feedback from the teachers from our village kindergarten: the kids who have gone through our playgroup program have excellent skill level and base to start their schooling.

During the year of 2022, total of 46 kids joined our playgroup. In the first group we had 23 and second one 23 again. This year, we developed the program by making official playgroup uniforms for all the children in the program.

NEW HSH PLAYGROUND

In January 2022 we implemented collaboration project together with Nurjapuoli ry. As the first cooperation project between the two organizations, the project team designed and build a full playground to HSH Center. This included a slide, seesaw, sandbox, and swings. All the items were made from wood with local carpenter.

In addition, the cooperation project included children's art workshop, where children had a chance to join the work and make things together.

On 4th of February, the new HSH playground was officially opened in joyful opening ceremony together with HSH team, Nurjapuoli ry and HSH playgroup children. Very quickly after opening, children's joy filled the entire yard.





KALEVALA TRAINING CENTER

In 2019, Kalevala Koru was looking for a partner and a charity, whereas much of the grant as possible would go directly to the project. It was also important that the impact of the grant was as large as possible and that it could measured. These were all fulfilled for the Home Street Home and Kalevala Training Center project. With knowledge and skill, together we can change the world.

During the spring and summer of 2020, with the funding of Kalevala Koru, we have built and established a training center for girls and young women. Kalevala Koru is responsible for financing the project and Home Street Home handles the operational side of the project. With the Kalevala Training Center, we can train vulnerable girls and young women. The courses are aimed at uneducated girls aged 16-25.

Girls are still at a disadvantage compared to boys. Girls' education is threatened by poverty, family attitudes and crisis situations. Cases of exploitation of girls, early pregnancies, forced marriages and cases of human trafficking remain common. In addition, in the daily lives of families, girls are placed more responsible for housekeeping, cooking, and caring for children, while boys can focus on their studies. In the evenings, the girls cook, do the dishes, and do the laundry, so the time available for homework is reduced. This leads to a decline in a girl's school performance and even dropping out of school.





KTC COURSE PROGRAM

The education areas of the Kalevala Training Center are part of the Kenyan education system. At the end of the courses, students can take a national final exam, after which they receive an official certificate of competence. We offer three different courses: Computer Packages, Salon & Hairdressing and Tailoring & Dressmaking. During the courses, students learn the basics of the fields in theory and practice. During the studies, competence is assessed and tested so that we can be sure that all students are keeping up. The teachers are six local hired teachers.

In addition to theory and practical skills, teaching will focus on entrepreneurial orientation and leadership themes. We want to encourage students to be entrepreneurial and coach them towards the future. Through motivational exercises, leadership lessons, and entrepreneurship themes, we aim to ensure that students are left with a variety of tools for the future. We are wishing to bring more additional courses and workshops to our students.





KTC PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT OF 2022

KITCHEN EXTENSION

On January 2022 we got confirmation, that on third project year, we would add lunch program to our KTC program. Since the lunch program was about to change our routines, we started to think of options how to make our small kitchen functional for the use. After multiple planning hours, we came with a plan of a kitchen extension. The idea of the extension was to add extra cooking area and serving balcony to the old kitchen. Together the old kitchen and new extension could easily serve 100 people if needed.

Since the lunch program was planned to start immediately after Ramadan, we needed to hurry up. After finishing the construction plan, we got our volunteers together and started to dig. The construction work took longer than we expected. Some of our team members were sick which caused delays to the schedule. Beside of the delay, the team worked well together and slowly but surely, our extension was rising.

ANNI'S KITCHEN

Our beautiful new kitchen is large and functional. The ceiling is high and windows large, which makes the kitchen very well ventilated. Now we have enough space to cook even for 100 people if needed.

KTC LUNCH PROGRAM

Since opening our training center, one of the biggest challenges our students have faced has been hunger. Most of our students are coming from low-income families. Some are leaving home without breakfast and spending the whole day in the class, without being able to buy lunch from the nearby cafés. We are grateful and excited that now is the time, to bring out our solution. KTC lunch program is here to provide lunch for all our students and staff members. Through the program, we can ensure our students are learning with filled stomachs and high energy level throughout the day. It is simple solution for simple but highly affecting problem.

JOB OPPORTUNITIES

EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES



HIGHLIGHTS OF KTC 2022



GRADUATION CEREMONIES

During the year 2022, we celebrated 4 KTC graduations. Every time, our ceremonies were full of joy and excitements. Our students received their certificates proudly and turned their heads towards new open doors. During the year, total of 139 students graduated. This included 48 computer class students, 57 salon & hairdressing students and 34 tailoring and dressmaking students.

KTC 2 YEAR BIRTHDAY

On August 25th 2022, we celebrated our second full year of running Kalevala Training Center. Our first year has been full of excitement. To celebrate another one year together, we decided to bake tons of cupcakes and massive birthday cake. We invited all students, teachers, and team members, and sang together a birthday song. Little party in the middle of a busy course program brought big smiles and lifted the motivation of the students and team members.



HSH GARDEN

Through our new lunch program, we haven been searching ways to improve our food supplier chain and make sure all the products are fresh. In additional, we want to keep up with our budget and ensure that we are able to serve lunch throughout the project year, even the global food price inflation is causing enormous increases in the food prices. For example, in the last 6 months, the price of a cooking oil has tripled.

We have worked with multiple different gardening and permaculture projects in the past couple of years, but this time, our agenda was slightly

different; lets do a pilot and try if we can produce our own vegetables to out kitchen, from our own garden. Through the gardening program, we would make sure, that all our products are fresh and locally produced without additional pesticides or other possibly harmful chemicals.



From idea to an action, our local and international volunteers started to prepare a gardening side and we planted our first seedlings. We planted tomatoes, eggplants, peppers, and green bell peppers. Due to sun and high temperatures our team committed to the daily watering schedules to keep the plants well. We have managed to sell some of the products to create income for the kitchen and the rest has gone straight to the lunch program.

HSH CHICKEN HOUSE

Since the food price inflation has affected the prices of eggs, we thought why we should buy eggs, while we could build our own chicken house and produce our own fresh eggs every day. We have done several chicken house projects to the community members in past, but this was our first chicken house in our center. In the end of September, we started our chicken house construction with our volunteer team. In the end of October we finished the construction of the chicken house. With the proper ventilation and well covered structure with a concrete floor on the ground, it's a guarantee that the chickens will be safe from any animals intrude.



In the beginning of November we bought 16 chickens including one rooster. We also invited a local expert in poultry farming who gave us basic information on the best ways of keeping chickens.





HSH LIBRARY & STUDY ROOM

The idea of the HSH Library & Study room program is to offer all children the possibility to use schoolbooks and materials outside teaching hours. In addition, we are using our library to organize extra classes, workshops, and trainings. Our library shelf has different school books, course books, revision books, novels and story books. There are also special materials like geometrical sets, games, and exercise books for students to use.

HOLIDAY PROGRAM FOR PRIMARY SCHOOL STUDENTS

In March and April during school holiday, we organized for holiday teaching program for primary school students. Together with teachers from Makongeni primary school, we organized classes for lower and upper primary school students.

Grade 1 to 3 had an opportunity to participate special arranged educative classes, games and organized outdoor activities planned by our social service interns and teachers. On the other side upper class students had intensive revision classes. They learned maths, English, science, and social studies.

Total of 60 students participated the holiday program.

SATURDAY TUTION PROGRAM IN MAKONGENI PRIMARY SCHOOL

On June, the teachers of Makongeni primary school, send us request to help them to organize extra classes for the students who were preparing to their final exams. Together with the teachers, we decided to start Saturday tuition program, which was open for all upper primary students.

This Saturday tuition was part of our library program, but this time organized in the school. The program was targeted for class 6, 7 and 8 and total number of 160 students attended the classes. The classes happened for a period of 3 months from September to November. This was in a bid to prepare them for the final national exams coming December.



HSH DAY CARE CENTER

HSH Day Care Center is a day care for children with special needs. The purpose of the project is to create a safe environment for children with special needs to learn, develop their skills, and get professional support. In addition, the purpose is to allow their parents to work and do their daily routines, while their child is in caring hands. Our focus for HSH Day Care Center is to help children with special needs in age between 3 months to 8 years from the area of Kwale County.

Day Care center will be constructed as a part of HSH Rescue Center. The building will include daycare and therapy facilities with cozy and child-friendly design and style. We want to create a special place where children can learn, play, and get inspired. We will equip the day care with professional therapy equipment and materials to meet the need of the children. Rooms will be decorated with art, textures, and playfulness.

During the year of 2022, we continued the construction work of the day care building. We finished plastering, flooring, painting, and window work. By end of the year, only final touches were remaining before furnishing work can continue.

PART 2: EDUCATION SUPPORT PROGRAMS




HSH FEEDING PROGRAM

Majority of the children in this area go to school without breakfast because of poverty. As a result, this project has contributed to improved concentration and activeness of the pupils during class time, and in turn better academic performance in the long-term.

HSH Feeding Program gives kindergarteners an opportunity to stay concentrated in class without hunger. This is achieved through feeding the kindergarten school going children with nutritious porridge every morning-break at school. As a pilot project, it was started in Makongeni in 2016 and it is now on going. The project is hailed to be successful by the parents and teachers of Makongeni Pre-primary school. In 2021, we added second school to our program and now also kids from Gazi are served porridge.

In 2022 our HSH Feeding Program was running smoothly throughout the whole year. Our HSH Feeding Program cook Mauwa and our volunteers made sure porridge was served in every school day. In addition, our second feeding program in Gazi, run through out the year.

NUMBER OF PUPILS IN HSH FEEDING PROGRAM 2016-2022





HSH TRUST

We believe that good education is the key to break the cycle of poverty and to create a better future for children and their families. Therefore, we promote education in the community by facilitating sponsorship for vulnerable students and pupils who otherwise would not have a chance to attend.

The aim of the HSH Trust program is to support children by covering their school fees, buying uniforms and other essential school supplies, and supporting the child's well-being, to ensure the continuality of their school path.

HSH TRUST DAYS 2022

The idea of the Trust Day is to invite all the children and their parents and guardians together. Trust Days are a chance to share information, empower, collect data, and share materials to all our HSH Trust families at the same time.

In 2022, we organized two HSH Trust Days. One in January and another one in May. During these days we shared for example, hygiene products exercise books, pens, rubbers, rulers, geometrical sets, revision books, school bags, crayons, watercolours, graph books, glue, dictionaries, and school uniforms to all HSH Trust kids.

During our Trust Days we also had a good chance to catch up with all the parents and guardians at once. During our parents' meetings we discussed for example about health-related issues and how to prevent spread of diseases. We also discussed together about family planning and contraception, children's learning difficulties, and how to create a safe and supportive environment for a child.

CHALLENGES WITH TRUST PROGRAM IN 2022

Since starting the Trust program in 2016, we have faced challenges in maintaining the program. While Trust Day system works very well and gives us opportunity to reach more than a hundred children and their families at once, it is much harder to communicate effectively to all of their sponsors. We want the program and its attention lie on the kids, but unfortunately, at the moment, the communication and work with the sponsors requires more time.

In addition, when the Ukrainian war started, many of our Trust sponsors decided to turn their support to Ukraine. That meant, that almost half of the sponsors, pulled out at the same time. This left us in very difficult situation: should we dropped those children out or what should we do? We decided to continue until end of the school year, November 2022, and try to find a solution by beginning of next school year.

PART 3: HSH WORKSHOPS & TRAININGS



HSH BABYSHOWER

In Finland all expectant mothers are given a baby box. It's like a starter kit of clothes, sheets, toys, and other baby products. The box itself can be even used as a bed. It's tradition that dates to 1930s and it's designed to give all children in Finland, no matter what background they are from, an equal start in life.

In 2016 we wanted to bring our own baby boxes to mothers here in Kenya. As a result, we started our HSH Babyshower program. The aim of the program is to share well-designed baby basins, organize trainings and connect new mothers together.

During 2021 we developed HSH Babyshower as full and created a new babyshower workshop package. Our new workshops focused on nutrition, hygiene & skin care, vaccinations, baby's development milestones and child's first aid. In addition, we also discussed about the importance of regular clinic visits and birth certificate application process.

In 2022 we continued to run the program with the new workshop routine. In March, We organized Babyshower event for 100 mothers. four groups of 25 mothers arrived to our center and participated our maternity workshops led by wonderful Clara. After the workshops, we shared baby basins to all participated mothers.



HSH BABYSHOWER WORKSHOP TRAINER: CLARA

Our wonderful HSH Babyshower trainer is Clara. Clara is lifeguard, first aider, county hospital maternity worker and mother of three. Clara understands the cultural and environmental context the mothers are living in. She understands how background, culture and religion affect the life of a mother and her child. She is also having a high knowledge about natal clinic services and general governmental services in the area.

She is simply the best person to lead the workshops and teach the mothers.



HSH GIRL'S & BOY'S CLASSES

The aim of the HSH Girl's Class program is to teach youths about topics of sexual education. Our program aims to develop and strengthen the ability of children and young people to make conscious, satisfying, healthy and respectful choices regarding relationships, sexuality, and emotional and physical health.

The main topics of the HSH Girl's & Boy's Classes are sexual health and rights, but the class covers plenty of other related topics as well. Other topics that are also stressed includes puberty, menstruation, menstruation hygiene and different menstruation utensils like reusable sanitary towels and menstruation cups for example. In addition, the program covers topics such as safe sex, different birth control methods, the risks of home abortion and where to get help, if someone is pressuring you for sex.

This year we have organized two girl's class programs that were held on March 3O-31st and 21st, 28th and 29th of September respectively. Primary school students and students of Kalevala Training Center had an opportunity to attend a Home Street Home's one-day Girls Class program. The five days classes were led by Cecilia our HSH Health Clinic, Clinical officer.

In March the classes were organized as part of the school holiday tuition program which involved both boys and girls. 50 girls and 25 boys aged 12-17 attended the classes.

The second girl's class program on September focused on our KTC students. In September a total of 43 girls of different age group participated and attended the classes.



ENTREPRENEURSHIP BOOTCAMP

On 20th to 22nd April 2022, we organized our second entrepreneurship bootcamp in collaboration with Ambitious Africa and LUTES. Ambitious Africa is providing high-quality education for future African educators and top-level business development support for local entrepreneurs. LUTES is a student-led organization that operates in the Lappeenranta campus and its aim is to create and open and inspiring environment for entrepreneurship and self-development.

25 students from KTC joined the bootcamp and jumped deeper to the entrepreneurship world. During the training the participants identified problems, build solutions, and turned them into business ideas.

In the beginning of the training most of the students were shy to speak. However, it was exciting to see how our students gained self-confidence and eventually throw themselves in to the program. At the end each of the participants had an opportunity to pitch their business idea in front of the group. As a cherry on the cake, after the bootcamp, everyone was given certificate of participation.

STUDENT WORK



HSH VOLUNTEERING

We work as a team together with both local and international volunteers. Volunteer work is a good way to help, meet new people and participate in something that is important to you. There are many proven personal benefits of community volunteerism. Working together with a group of people who have different ethnicity, life backgrounds, and views reduces stereotypes. Community volunteerism has also been proven to improve student's academic success. Home Street Home's voluntary program allows both international and local volunteers to join our work. Volunteers are important team members who accomplish sthe practical work on the field.

LOCAL VOLUNTEERING

Our local team members are active youth who are passionate to work for their community. Local volunteers are our local guides for the international volunteers. As a HSH local volunteer, one can learn new skills, gain expertise and get new experiences with various projects and work tasks. We hope that volunteering with us can open a new chapter in one's life and lead him/her to somewhere great.

In 2022 our team grew with 2 new local members, which means we had 15 local volunteers during the year. This makes it total of 40 local volunteers since starting our program.

INTERNATIONAL VOLUNTEERING

As an international HSH Volunteer, volunteer will have opportunity to learn about Kenyan culture, expand her/his networks, improve language skills and gain project and life experiences. Working in another country gives volunteer the opportunity to step outside the comfort zone, to learn new approaches to tasks and problems and to operate in different environments.

In 2022 we received the highest number of international volunteers. Between January and December, we hosted total of 76 internationals from Finland, Switzerland, Spain, England, France, Scotland, and Netherlands.




VOLUNTEERING WITH HOME STREET HOME

"As soon as I stumbled upon an article about Viola and Home Street Home work, I knew I had to find out more. I arranged a video call with Viola and she answered all my questions, making me feel at ease and excited for this exciting opportunity to visit Kenya - a completely new country, culture, and environment for me. Without hesitation, I booked my flight for stay of six months.

When I finally arrived in Makongeni, a village situated on Kenya's east coast, I was heartily welcomed with open arms and endless generosity. The Finnish volunteers and local community members alike made me feel right at home. Looking back, I remain in awe of the many wonderful people I met during my six months in Kenya. Their strength and invaluable life skills - often lost on those of us used to comfortable Western lifestyles - were a humbling and inspiring reminder of what truly matters in life. Despite facing all kinds of hardships, the Kenyan people I met were always quick to smile and make light of any situation.

After a brief period of rest, the real work began, and it was both challenging and enjoyable. With music always playing in the background and a steady stream of jokes being told, the days never felt too long. We worked on a range of different projects, including building a health clinic and a house for a local family. I discovered some new skills such as mixing cement



In addition to that I was also exposed to Kenyan culture, language, and food. Above all else, however, it was the conversations with the locals that taught me the most. Despite our vastly different backgrounds, I was amazed by how much we had in common.

Although life in Kenya was very different from what I was used to, I discovered that some of the most important lessons in life can be learned from the simplest of things. Upon returning home, I've made a conscious effort to live more simply, to treat everyone with kindness and to appreciate the little things in life. This is the most valuable lesson I took away from my time with Home Street Home."

In the planning and implementation of the educational activities, I got to utilise both functional- and creative working methods related to group supervisioning- and guidance. The work, carried out in unfamiliar culture and environment, improved my grasp on culture-sensitive working methods and improved my skills of active listening and perception, which are crucial skills of a pro regarding social services."

PART 5: OTHER PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS

HSH HAKI KIT

The aim of HSH Haki Kit program is to support the rights of children or youths in a case of any form of violence. This might be sexual abuse, physical or mental abuse, violence, or any other form of child abusing. Our role is to facilitate in the reporting process and guide the victim or family to the right services.

During 2022, we supported total of 7 cases of sexual abuses, early pregnancies, and cases of domestic violence.





HSH CONTAINER

In fall 2021, we started our first HSH Container project. The aim of the project was to collect material donations from companies, groups, and individuals in Finland, and to ship a full container to our HSH Center in Kenya. During fall 2021 we received a large amount of donations and managed to hit the target quickly. After collecting all items, we sorted, listed, reorganized, and packed all the donations.

In January 2022, we started doing the paperwork for the container shipment. Being our first time to do this, this was a learning process for our Kenyan team. It required several trips to different government offices in Mombasa and Nairobi. It took about six months for us to get all the necessary documentation and approvals from the Kenyan authorities prior to shipment. Most of the time we experienced long delays in the documentation and permit approval process due to excessive bureaucracy and corruption.

Finally, when the paperwork was finished, our container started its journey by the sea in June 2022. Forty-foot container full of medical equipment, furniture, clothing, and other materials started its journey from Finland to Mombasa port and finally to Makongeni village.

The container entered the port of Mombasa on 11th September for clearance and duty tax payment. After the clearance, it was released and finally delivered to our center in Makongeni on the 24th September 2022.

The entire process cost the organization approximately 496K shillings for clearance and documentation, excluding 973K shipping fee which was paid by anonymous company donor.





SORTING THE CONTAINER DONATIONS

After receiving the container, our next task was to unpack and sort all the boxes and plan, how to proceed with the items. The container donations included different kind of hospital equipment and materials to our clinic, mobilization tools and other disability equipment to our daycare, toys and games, school supplies, materials to our baby basins and other important tools and materials to our center. These donations will massively help us to improve our center and our projects.

FUNDRAISING AND FINANCE OF 2022

FUNDRAISING METHODS OF THE YEAR 2022

MEMBER- AND SPONSORSHIP PROGRAMS

Home Street Home member- and sponsorship programs are way to look for long-term supporters. Member-supporters are supporting monthly or annually organization's work. Sponsorship supporters are supporting monthly one child, family, or project. Supporters can be individuals, companies, or groups. During the year of 2022 the number of sponsors and members dropped slightly due the effects of the Ukrainian war. However, the number started to raise again by end of the year.

DONATIONS AND GRANTS

During the year of 2022, Home Street Home received less donations compared to the previous year. However, the amount started to raise again, by end of the year. Most of the donations were received from individuals and some from companies.

PRODUCT SELLING

Product selling is simple fundraising method. During the year of 2022, we sold handmade bags, wallets, dolls, toys, hair scrunchies, baskets, wrap-around dresses, and trays. Most of the selling was done through social media.

COLLABORATIONS WITH COMPANIES, ORGANIZATIONS, OR GROUPS

Good collaboration can bring positive effect for both parties. In 2022, we continued our Kalevala Training Center collaboration with Kalevala Koru. We also continued our HSH Health Clinic collaboration with Medipulssi.


