HOME STREET HOME

Home Street Home (HSH) is a non-profit organization located in Makongeni village, Kwale County, Kenya. It was founded in 2014 and registered in Finland (2014), in Kenya (2015) and in Switzerland (2020). The organization runs projects in the area of Kwale County with the main aim to empower and support children, youth, and families in distress.

The main project of the organization is HSH Center. HSH Center is located in Makongeni village and it's the heart of the organization. HSH Center includes training center for girls, playgroup for 3-year-old children, community health clinic, library and, daycare for children with special needs. In addition, Home Street Home organizes trainings and workshops, runs porridge program in local kindergartens and aims to support the local community through its other projects and activities.

HSH team is in charge of the implementation of the projects and programs of HSH. HSH Team includes HSH board, employees, local and international volunteers, interns, and local experts. Everyone has their own role and place in HSH family.

Home Street Home is collecting its funds mainly from Finland and from Switzerland. In both of the countries, fundraising is accomplished voluntarily through different fundraising activities such as charity events and product selling.

It is said that inequality starts at birth, but poverty attacks and affects children before they're even born. That's why our attention to the child starts when he or she is in womb and continues until the end of the education journey. We give special attention for the most vulnerable and often marginalized groups of the society. For example, children with disabilities are among the most vulnerable and excluded groups in the world. Labelling, neglect, and stereotyping are some of the social barriers that children with disabilities and their families face in society.

All children have equal rights to care and protection, and to live a healthy life free from abuse and harm. We are here to play our role in this and do our best in our little circle, in Makongeni.

ON THE JOURNEY OF CHANGE

Development is a constant process that brings change. It creates growth and brings progress. It is a necessary and useful, positive change that our world and different societies needs. Home Street Home aims to support the development, the positive change, in its working area. We want to do our part to support the implementation of sustainable development goals and push the development ahead.

We are learning more every day through our internal project evaluation, impact assessments and even more, through the world around us: world changes every day, and it influences our work. It helps us to work smarter and more effectively.

Government of Kenya is constantly doing its best to improve the quality of life and hundreds of organizations in our area, are bringing their input to the table. Over the past 8 years, our village, Makongeni, has changed massively: new buildings, better infrastructure, more services available and people's wellbeing and health has significantly improved. This proves, that change is happening – every day. We want to be part of the change and contribute positively to the development of the area.

As an organization, we believe that our role is to support the community in the change and development. We can fill those gaps that other parties cannot reach. We can create stability and provide services. However, we need to be open for change and ready to develop our systems, methods and thinking. Since world is not the same, we shouldn't be either.

This means, that at every turn we take, we need to evaluate our work critically and analyze the changing socio-economic environment, government policies, laws, and structures around us.

FINDING THE RIGHT WAY TO HELP

Since establishing the organization, we have been actively searching the answer to a simple question: what is the right way to help? This might seem like simple question, but while looking deeper into it, you can realize that it is much more complex than it might seem.

Home Street Home was founded with the ideology of helping others. Somewhere far behind, there was the moment, where the founders decided: let's do this, to help the needy ones. That's how it all begun. Helping others, makes people feel good. It makes us feel good that we have contributed to someone's wellbeing and helped make their world a better place.

Helping people is not always simple. After helping people for years through different projects and programs, we have faced the problematic side of help: both for us and for the person we've helped. When we effectively help someone to solve their problem, they may learn one thing: that we are good at solving their problems for them. That means that in future, when they have problems, they come to us again and again, never learning to solve their own issues, and instead depending on us to do it for them. This is called dependency syndrome.

To fight against this problematic circle, we have slowly transformed our work into different direction: Instead of helping people in personal level, directly, we have focused our minds on providing services and expertise in the community level. For instance, we have opened a health clinic, we are running a training center and providing breakfast porridge in the local pre-primary schools. It is our way of stepping away from the dependency syndrome.

Through this process of searching the right and wrong, we have come to the place where we are today. It is influencing our decision making and all choices we have made, to move forward with our organization. However, we cannot say, that we have found the ultimate right way to help. It is constantly developing while our organization is growing, our team is gaining more expertise and the community around us is developing.

HOME STREET HOME & SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

Sustainable development is development that creates and safeguards good living conditions for present and future generations. The UN's 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development aims to eradicate extreme poverty and achieve sustainable development that takes equal account of the environment, the economy, and people.

In everything we do, we strive to grow and develop in a way that creates well-being while respecting nature and the environment. CHANGING WORLD

The world has made it clear that we live in a world of constant change. The climate crisis, the pandemic years, war of Ukraine and climate refugees have shown that we must be constantly prepared to adapt to a changing world.

In all our activities, we collect data and evaluate the effectiveness of our projects. We seek to identify and create metrics to measure successes, challenges, and impact. We work with local authorities and share our knowledge, findings, and observations.



HOME STREET HOME YEAR 2023

YEAR OF CHANGE

After the constant change in recent years, we have focused on finding ways to adapt to the constantly changing world situation. Instead of just waiting for more stable times, it has been time to find ways to keep our project going and try to keep pace with change - despite the challenges.

Our team continues to grow, which also poses different changes and challenges. We do not know our team members in the same way as before, and this has also required some adaption. At the same time, the role of management has grown even further while the past year. The team leaders have made significant progress over the past year, and they will ensure that even as the team grows, the work will run smoothly.

Last year, we got our first Erasmus -interns to Makongeni, we have employed three new local experts for our projects, and our local volunteer team has also grown. We are able to offer new types of volunteer tasks, for example, in the kitchen, day care, and Kalevala Training Center. In addition to encouraging more and more local volunteers to participate in our activities and in the development of the community, different kind of projects can also increase their skills and make use of their previous knowledge. When volunteering has provided team members with skills that have enabled them to find employment elsewhere, we feel that we have succeeded.

As we have been adapting to the new normal, we have also worked to make sure that our project models are modern and ethical. Over the years, the needs of the community will also change, and we must meet these needs. With our new main goal, we have focused on making our projects more goal-oriented and creating opportunities for development in the community. In addition, we have sought to become more self-sufficient, for example through the development of our own chicken house, garden as well as solar - and water systems, so we can also find relief in difficult times.

In June 2023, we were finally able to open the door of the HSH Day Care. Since then, we have been able to live with the change with families of the children who use our daycare services. Already in the beginning, in the first three months, we were able to see how the activities of the daycare center and the therapy services produced results. Our clinic expanded with the addition of the new building as well as a hematology analyzer, which will enable us to provide more comprehensive health services to the community.

2024 will be the anniversary of our organization. One of the key objectives of the year is to ensure an even more effective division of responsibilities among key personnel. Another important objective is to celebrate our incredible journey and make our projects more visible, so that people would know what teamwork has accomplished in Makongeni.

We are ready for another year with Home Street Home. We are ready to re-evaluate, develop and run the projects with even greater results. It is time to open a new chapter and welcome the 10th year of HSH.

PROJECTS AND PROGRAMS OF 2023

PART 1: HSH CENTER

HSH CENTER

HSH Center is located in Makongeni village, and it is the heart of the organization. HSH Center combines the most needed services and expertise all together in one place. We see our center as an important service provider that supports the local social-, health- and education services by giving an extra helping hand through multiple services. Our center aims to support the development and same time ensure that by 2030 we are achieving sustainable development goals.

Our HSH Center includes five main sectors: a training center for girls, a community health clinic, a playgroup for 3-year-old children, a library, and a daycare for children with special needs. In addition, we also have our own vegetable garden and chicken house which produce fresh ingredients for our kitchen.





DEVELOPMENT AND MAINTENANCE OF HSH CENTER IN 2023

During the year of 2023, with the help of our volunteers, we have focused on construction and improving the existing building structures. We accomplished the daycare building, finished water tower, build carpentry shade, and we started to work with the outdoor landscape by fixing galana paths, and planting more trees and flowers.

Electricity and water has been major challenges for the operation of the center. During the year we had multiple long power outages and the village's water system was off for weeks and weeks. Due the constant challenges, we decided to finally continue our water tower project, and accomplished our own water tower. Same time we were searching for long-term solutions for access to safe, clean water.

In addition to the electrical and water issues, another major challenge was waste. Our center is producing enlarging amount of waste every day. Since there is no general waste solution available in the area, we started to search innovations and solutions, that could possibly solve our challenge by creating minimum environmental harm.

In the next sections, we will go through the project descriptions, development steps and general updates of each of the HSH Center projects.



HSH HEALTH CLINIC

HSH Health Clinic was opened in April 2020. The project aims to provide high-quality outpatient services for the most vulnerable families in Makongeni village and nearby areas. We are targeting especially the ones who are living in extreme poverty and are most often not accessing public health care services. Our clinic serves people from Monday to Friday at 8 am to 4 pm.

Our clinic is led by local health professional, Cecilia. Cecilia is a qualified clinical officer. Her specialty is children and pediatrics. She also has high knowledge of the needs and challenges in rural areas.



IMPACT

Our HSH Health Clinic project is having a direct and strong impact on the community around us. Every day we serve the people and assist the needy ones. The care and treatment itself, are having a huge positive impact. Bringing good-quality care, guidance, and counseling inside the community supports long-term development. Through guidance and constant health education, we can prevent diseases and improve the well-being of the people.

During January – December 2023, we served a total of 2633 patients. From the total number of patients, 1122 patients were under 5 years old, and 782 were 5-18 years old. This year our total number of patients was significantly lower than 2022. The main reason for this is that our clinical officer was on maternity leave and during that period, our clinic was closed.

CLINIC EXTENSION

Our clinic extension has been our long-term goal and we have been taking small steps towards it over the last 2 years. After the construction of the extension room was finalized, we needed to use the space as storage for donated goods that were shipped from Finland. At the beginning of year 2023, we were finally able to sort the last items and finally finalize the room. In May, we finally cleaned the room and arranged furniture and equipment on point. We started to use the extension in the beginning of July.

Our extension serves the clinic as an observation unit, additional storage space, wound dressing area, and blood sample station. It provides important extra space and privacy when needed. Also, it allows us to observe patients over the day. For example, we are now able to provide day-time care for a patient who needs IV Fluids or IV medication. Since the patient will be able to rest in the observation unit, attending other patient can still move on in the consultation room.



HSH DENTAL CLINIC PILOT

As trial for possible development of HSH Health Clinic, we organized a dental clinic pilot with collaboration of dentist from Finland. The aim of the pilot was to collect data of dental health challenges in the area and evaluate the need for possible dental health project.

The pilot program started in January 2023. First our team arranged dental care room to our old office room. We had recently received donation, that included dental care equipment and we ordered more through our clinic suppliers.

During the three week pilot period we had 73 patient visits: 12 kids and the rest of them adults. The first two weeks were quieter, but in the last week, there were 34 visits. The most common reason for the visits was tooth pain (approximately 90% of the cases) and the second common was a broken tooth. We removed 50 teeth in total (first week 12, second 12, last 26), but total of 117 teeth should be extracted, so there are still 67 left to be extracted. The most common diagnosis were pulpitis, apical periodontitis, and periodontitis. We did 20 calculus removing to treat periodontitis.

Most of the patients brushed their teeth only once in a day, only in the mornings. No one from the patients did flossing regularly, but few of them had heard about it. Nearly all the patients had been using a medium or a hard toothbrush. We showed to every patient how to brush their teeth and how to use toothfloss with a model jaw. We also recommend them to use a soft or extra soft toothbrush and to brush their teeth mornings and evenings.





Most of the patients hadn't ever visited a dentist. And there were cases where they had gone to the dentist, and they only got painkillers for pulpitis (for a tooth that should have been extracted) or where only the crown has been extracted and the roots with the inflammation stayed in the jaw causing even bigger problems. It was also a new thing for the patients that we cared about their pain and put more anesthetic during the procedure if needed.

This pilot showed us that there is a big need for dental care services in the village and in the surrounding area. It would be very important to continue providing dental care for the people in Makongeni, because deficiencies in oral health can cause problems with the whole general health, inflammations from mouth can spread all over the body, to heart, lungs and brains. And it would matter the most if we could do some preventing, like yearly checkups. Then we could do the treatments when the cavities are so small that they can be treated with fillings and so we could avoid so many extractions and days and weeks and months and even years with tooth pain. The most heartbreaking patient case was a man around 40 years: he had had a so bad tooth pain for 4 years that he has lost his job and even the painkillers weren't helping.

We did also a school visit to Makongeni Primary School where we taught oral health for 700 students and gave them toothbrushes and toothpastes.

PURCHASING OF HEMATOLOGY ANALYZER MACHINE

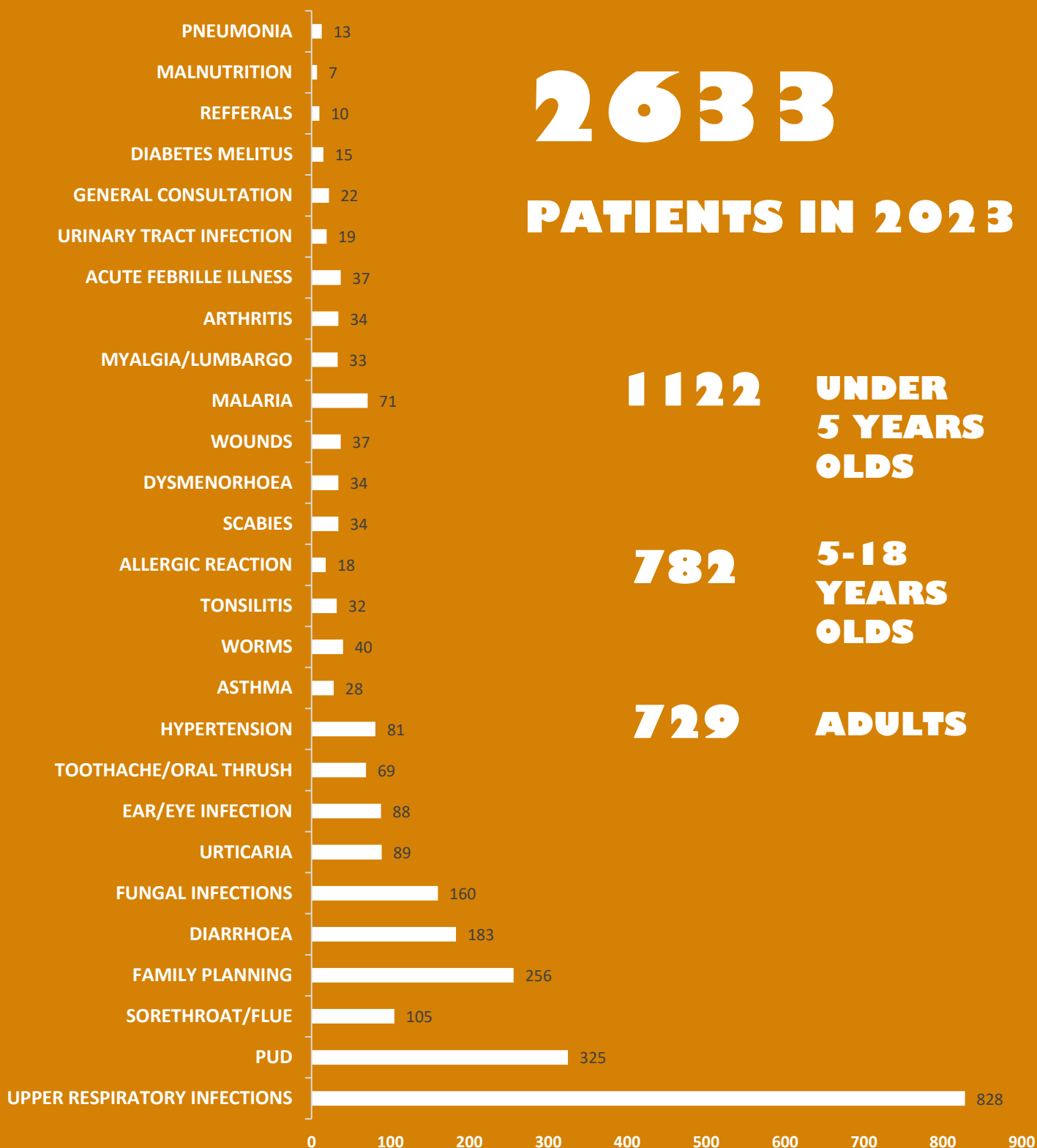
One of our biggest achievements of this year was that we were able to equip our clinic with a Hematology Analyzer. This was possible through a private donation. The Hematology machine is now in use at the clinic to conduct a complete blood count (CBC) to the patients and clients.

This means we are now being able to determine our patient's general health status. Blood check-up can be very expensive in most facilities around here and many people are not able to pay for the service. In most of the facilities nearby are charging 1000 – 1500 shillings for complete blood count. At the clinic we are charging each patient 300 shillings which is equivalent to around 2 Euros. The collected money is used to buy the machines, supplies and maintenance.

This is a big boost to our clinic. The analyzer gives us more information about our client's health, and it allows us to evaluate our patient's wellbeing more precisely. This has also reduced the number of referrals, since we are now able to do CBC by ourselves.

HSH CHILDREN'S PLAYGROUP

HSH Children's Playgroup is targeted to 3-year-old children, who are supposed to join kindergarten in the following school year. The aim of the program is to provide high-quality early childhood education and support to children. In our playgroup, children are learning important skills, such as language skills, numbers, motoric skills, and groupwork skills. They are learning how to follow orders, how to play together and how to color, paint and connect dots. They are singing, dancing, playing, and doing arts and crafts.

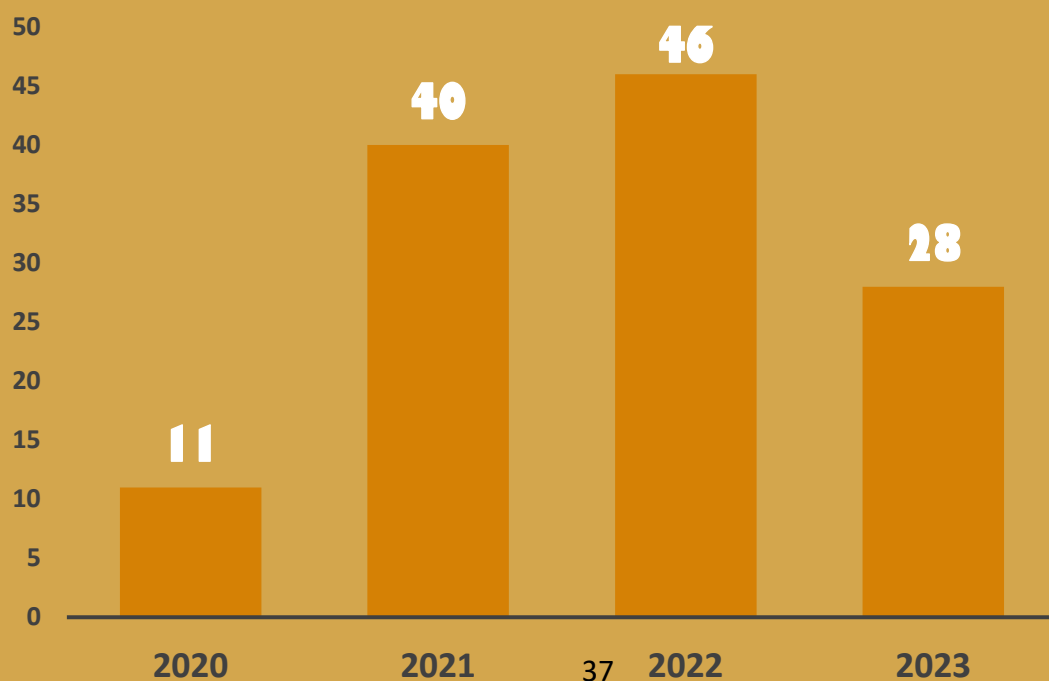
Our playgroup program runs every day from morning up to midday. During break-time, the kids are getting cup of porridge and enjoying fresh air outside. The program is led by early childhood education teacher with an assistant.

During the year of 2023, total of 28 children joined the playgroup. During the year we had only one group, which continued from January up to graduation in the end of October. During the year our early childhood education teacher Priscilla swifed to work in another program. Through the changes we hired a new teacher. In July Sumaiya joined the team as a new playgroup main teacher.



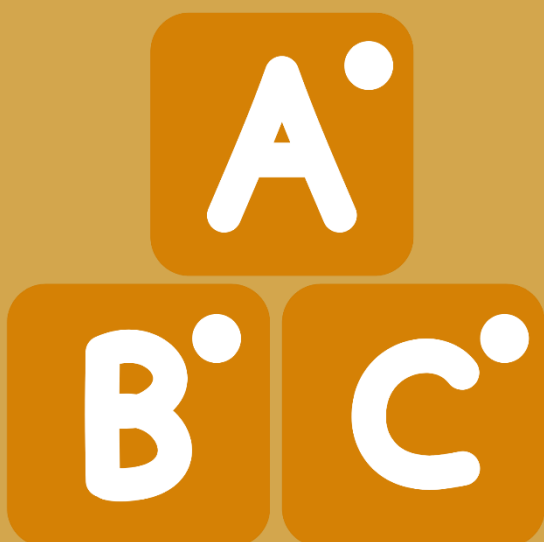


NUMBER OF PLAYGROUP KIDS SINCE STARTING THE PROGRAM

KALEVALA TRAINING CENTER

In 2019, Kalevala Koru was looking for a partner and a charity, whereas much of the grant as possible would go directly to the project. It was also important that the impact of the grant was as large as possible and that it could be measured. These were all fulfilled for the Home Street Home and Kalevala Training Center project. With knowledge and skill, together we can change the world.

During the spring and summer of 2020, with the funding of Kalevala Koru, we have built and established a training center for girls and young women. Kalevala Koru is responsible for financing the project and Home Street Home handles the operational side of the project. With the Kalevala Training Center, we can train vulnerable girls and young women. The courses are aimed at uneducated girls aged 16-25.

Girls are still at a disadvantage compared to boys. Girls' education is threatened by poverty, family attitudes and crisis situations. Cases of exploitation of girls, early pregnancies, forced marriages and cases of human trafficking remain common. In addition, in the daily lives of families, girls are placed more responsible for housekeeping, cooking, and caring for children, while boys can focus on their studies. In the evenings, the girls cook, do the dishes, and do the laundry, so the time available for homework is reduced. This leads to a decline in a girl's school performance and even dropping out of school.





KTC COURSE PROGRAM

The education areas of the Kalevala Training Center are part of the Kenyan education system. At the end of the courses, students can take a national final exam, after which they receive an official certificate of competence. We offer three different courses: Computer Packages, Salon & Hairdressing and Tailoring & Dressmaking. During the courses, students learn the basics of the fields in theory and practice. During the studies, competence is assessed and tested so that we can be sure that all students are keeping up. The teachers are six local hired teachers.

In addition to theory and practical skills, teaching will focus on entrepreneurial orientation and leadership themes. We want to encourage students to be entrepreneurial and coach them towards the future. Through motivational exercises, leadership lessons, and entrepreneurship themes, we aim to ensure that students are left with a variety of tools for the future. We are wishing to bring more additional courses and workshops to our students.





KTC LUNCH PROGRAM

Our KTC lunch program aims to provide lunch for all our students and staff members. Through the program, we can ensure our students are learning with filled stomachs and high energy level throughout the day. During the year 2023, our chef Shaban and kitchen helper Mauwa served lunch for the students and team members throughout the year.





IMPACTS

JOB OPPORTUNITIES

The project has given a permanent contract for eleven people: six teachers, administer, cleaner, cook, kitchen helper and security guard. For them, the job opportunity has been a great chance to sustain their families.

NEW BEGINNINGS

Chance to study and return into their school path, has been a great new beginning for many of our students. Most of our students have been growing individually and have stood up more confident than ever. We have seen girls joining the course with empty face and leaving the building with their heads high, carrying their certificate proudly.

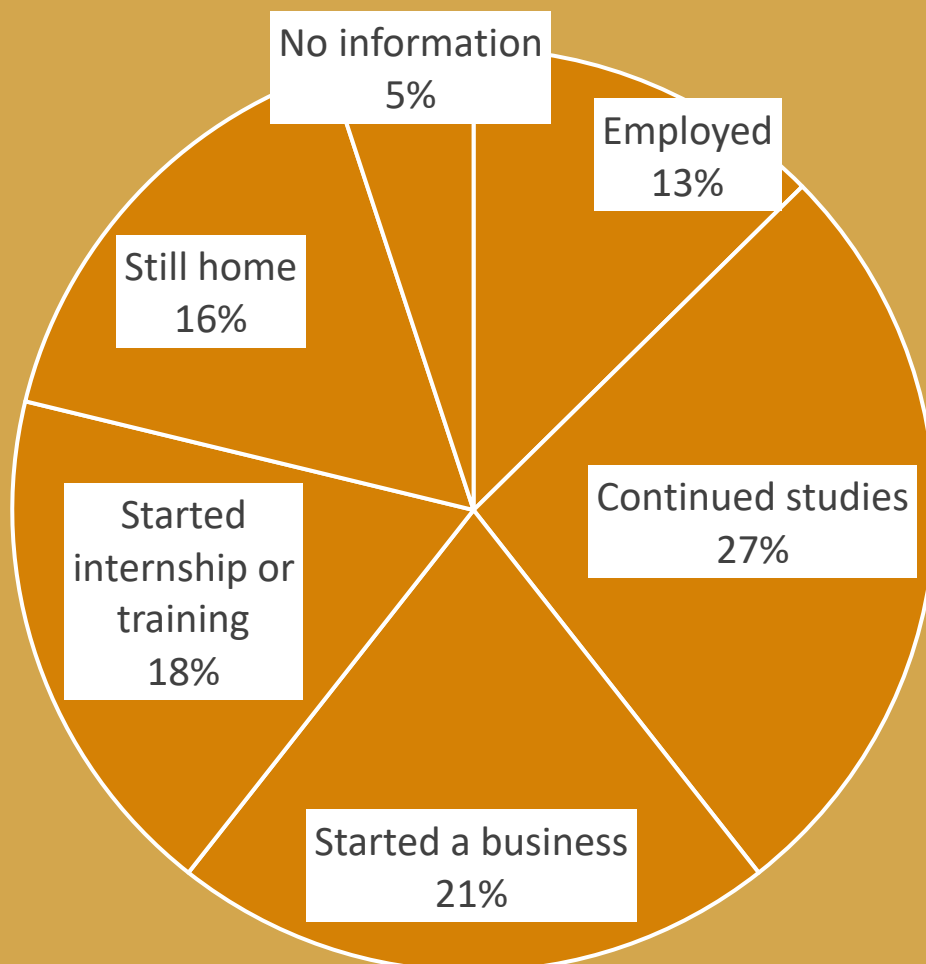
EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

KTC 3 YEARS BIRTHDAY

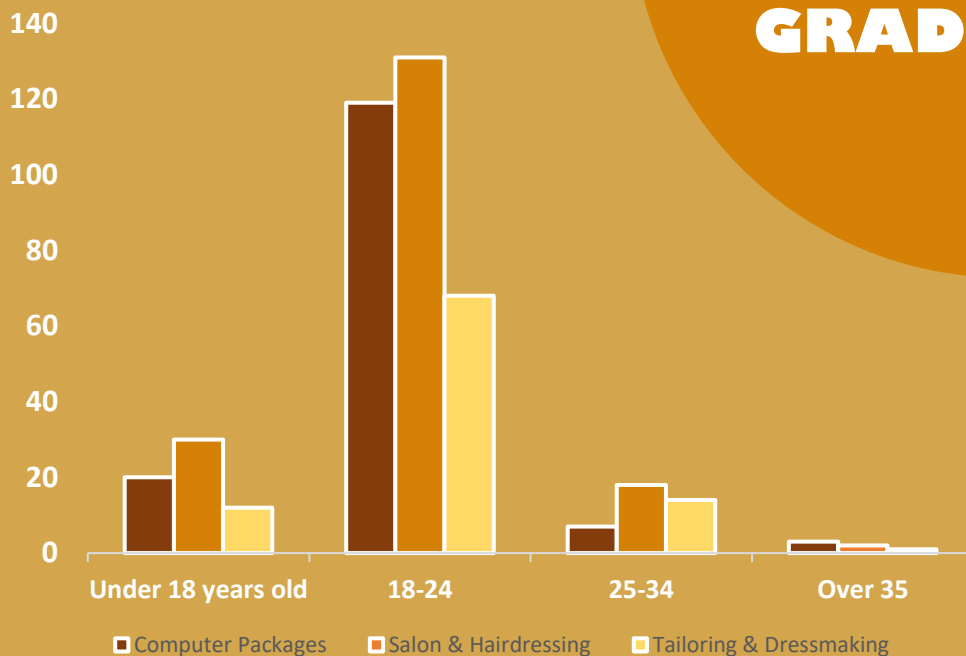

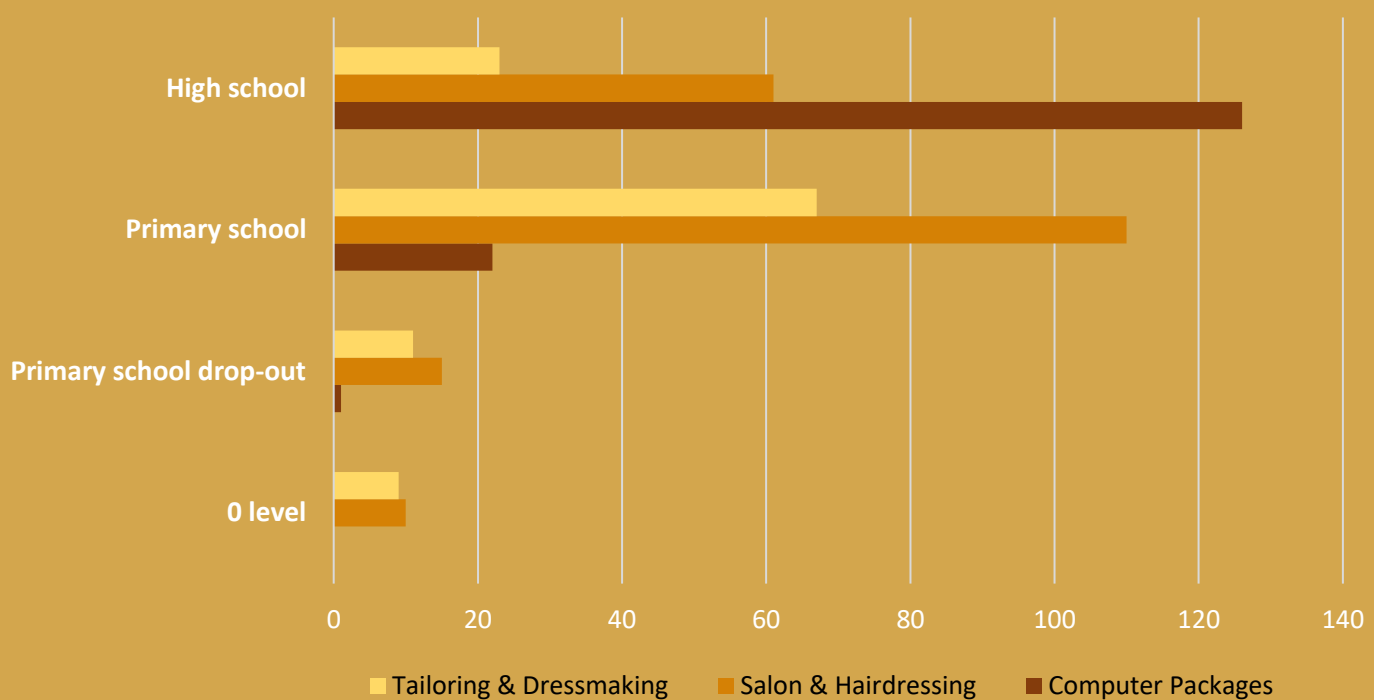

Our HSH Garden includes simple vegetable garden and two greenhouses. The garden project aims to produce fresh vegetables, herbs and fruits in our own compound.

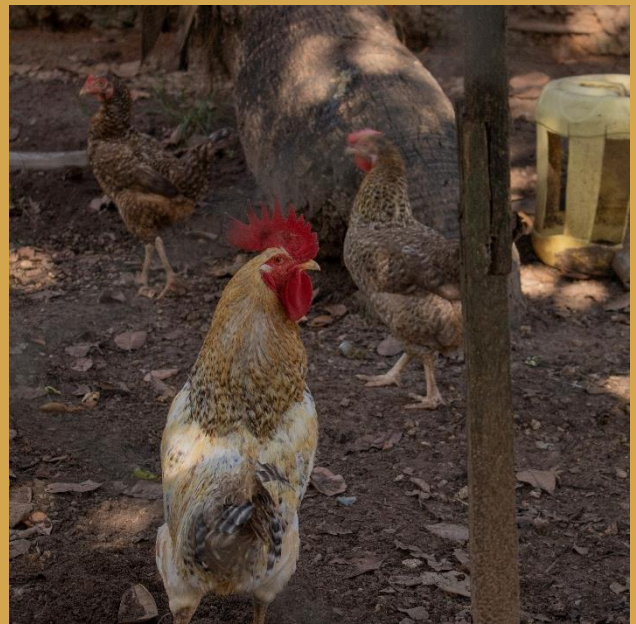
We started to work on our garden on early June and this time we planted zucchini, eggplants, and sweet potatoes. The food products are geared to support our daily meal programs, which include breakfast for the team and lunch program for the KTC students.



HSH CHICKEN HOUSE

Our chicken project was running the whole of 2023 with 15 chickens and rooster, the project has continuously provided eggs for the team breakfast and lunch program. Our team members kept a routine of feeding the chicken on daily basis which included morning and afternoon schedule.

With the produced eggs, we have seen a reduction on our daily expenditures and also improve the team balance diet.





HSH LIBRARY & STUDY ROOM

The idea of the HSH Library & Study room program is to offer all children the possibility to use schoolbooks and materials outside teaching hours. In addition, we are using our library to organize extra classes, workshops, and trainings. Our library shelf has different school books, course books, revision books, novels and story books. There are also special materials like geometrical sets, games, and exercise books for students to use.

TUITION PROGRAM FOR MAKONGENI PRIMARY SCHOOL

In 2022 we supported the village primary school by organizing extra classes and tuition for the pupils. In the beginning of the school year in January, the teachers asked if we could still continue with the program.

This time we decided to support the school with morning tuition and Saturday tuition. This meant that we paid for teachers salaries for the extra hours they did for the kids. We continued the tuition support through out the school year. In addition, we organized monthly revision exams for class 8 students who were preparing themselves for the national exams.

HOLIDAY PROGRAM FOR PRIMARY AND HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

During the end-year school holiday, we organized holiday teaching program for primary and high school students. The purpose of the holiday program is to provide educational activities for primary- and high-school children. Aim is to keep all children away from trouble and protect them from any forms of neglect or violence by providing a safe, inspiring, and active learning environment. Total of 80 children participated the holiday program.

This time our Holiday Program included activities such as:

- General learning in Math, English, science and social studies
- Hygiene, sexual education
- Environmental education
- Essay writing, reading & understanding
- Art & creativity
- Home science & chemistry

HSB DAY CARE CENTER

HSB Daycare Center is a daycare for children with special needs. The purpose of the project is to create a safe environment for children with special needs to learn, develop their skills, and get professional support. In addition, the purpose is to allow their parents to work and do their daily routines, while their child is in caring hands. Our focus for HSB Daycare Center is to help children with special needs in age between 3 months to 8 years from the area of Kwale County.

Daycare is constructed as a part of HSB Center. The building includes daycare and therapy facilities with cozy and child-friendly design and style. We want our daycare to be a special place where children can learn, play, and get inspired. The daycare is equipped with professional therapy equipment and materials to meet the need of the children.

Besides of the daycare services, HSB Daycare Center offers several therapy services for the children with special needs. Multiprofessional team ensures all the children are receiving the right treatment and attention. These specialists are there to ensure the establishment of professional support and help the children need. The center offers private one-to-one therapy sessions, group therapy and therapy sessions together with family members.

FINALIZING THE DAYCARE: READY FOR OPENING!



OPENING CEREMONY

HSH Day Care Center was officially opened on the 30th of May 2023. The event was special in its own way and one of the biggest ceremonies ever organized by Home Street Home. The opening was joined together with KTC Graduation ceremony and 65 students graduating. The venue was beautiful, inspirational, and eye catching, team members had been working very hard to make the day look colorful. Our team, HSH committee, community members, parents with kids with special needs and people living with special needs got together for the ceremony. Since it was a special day, we also invited officials from Kwale County government to come and celebrate with us.

We were honored to welcome Kwale County Deputy Governor Mr. Chirema Kombo, other designated government officials and our project partners to the ceremony. The event started with a ribbon cutting to officially open the building by Mr. Chirema Kombo. Then he was taken through a tour inside the building. He was impressed how beautiful, colorful and equipped our daycare was, and it was ready to serve the purpose.

Mr. Chimera and other guests who gave speeches applauded the daycare initiative which is the first one in Kwale County. During the speeches it was also mentioned that for many years children with special abilities have lived with limited support and mostly very poor services and discrimination within the community. This was said to be a new begging for many kids and parents who have suffered for a long time. HSH have now put smiles on faces for all the kids and parents who will be able to access the services.





HIRING AN OCCUPATIONAL THERAPIST

Before we opened our beautiful daycare, we announced that we are looking for a new team member to fill an occupational therapist position. Through our network we contacted several specialists in the field who recommended few therapists.

One of them was Caroline Mutheu and we managed to arrange a one-on-one meeting with her. She then convinced us that she is the right person to help the kids. Caroline is a qualified Occupational therapist and licensed by the government to work with kids who have special needs. Carol has recently graduated from her institute and before meeting us, she had worked as a home-based therapist for 3 months.

Caroline is bringing in expertise and skills to the team. Carol is a kind and caring person, who likes to give her time to her clients. She is calm and always ready to listen and have discussions. Carol likes working under pressure, and she is always ready for anything. She is flexible and she has been recently adapting to her work roles.

DAILY PROGRAM IN THE DAYCARE

HSH Day Care Center is open from Monday to Friday every day except for public holidays. A normal day starts at 7:30 am with preparations to receive the parents and the kids. The arrival of the clients starts at 8:00, and the activities commence immediately. During the pilot program, many children came to the center with their mother or guardian. Every day some family members participated in the daily activities with the children.

The activities during our pilot period included daily therapy sessions with the kids, porridge feeding time, free play time, group sessions, lunch and lots of playtime. Day ends at 3:30 pm and after the children have left, the team arranged the play areas and recorded daily notes.

Due to Thursday being a clinic day for the kids at the government hospitals, we decided that this day will be used for the team to focus on activity planning, recording, cleaning and sanitizing the toys and therapy equipment's.

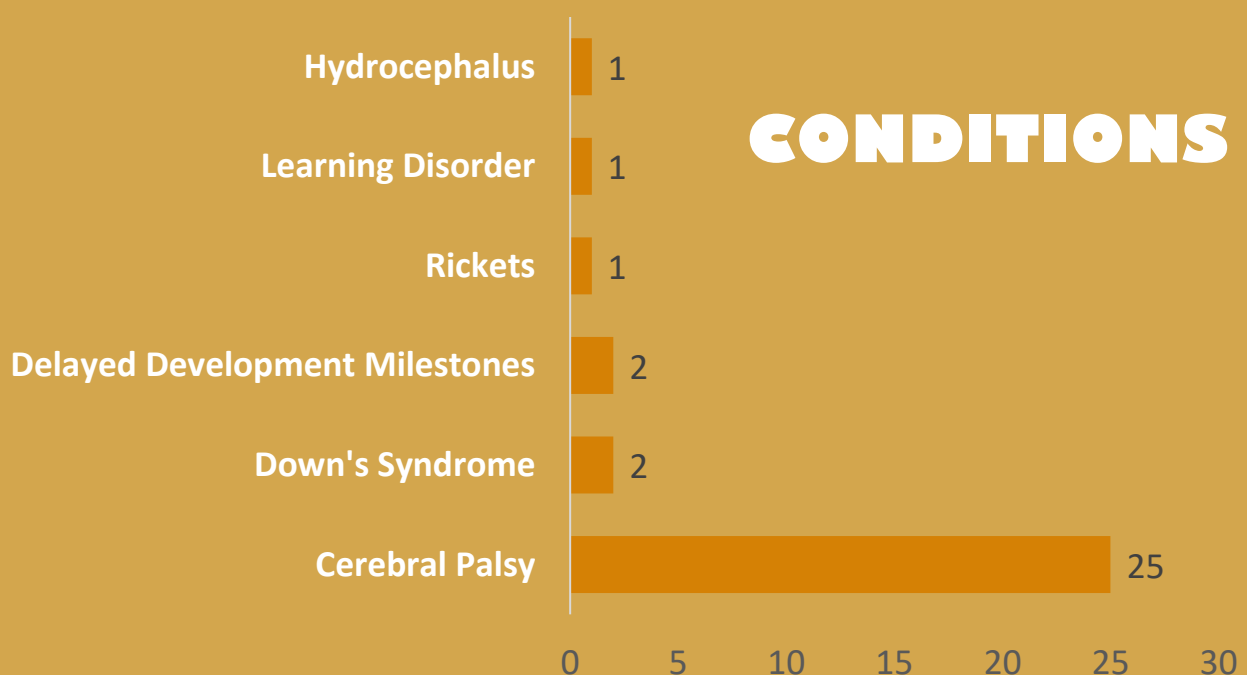
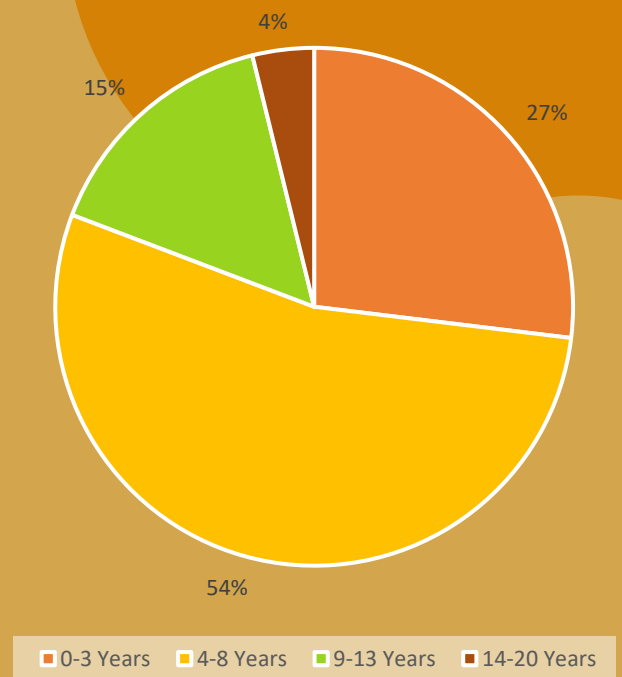



HSH FEEDING PROGRAM

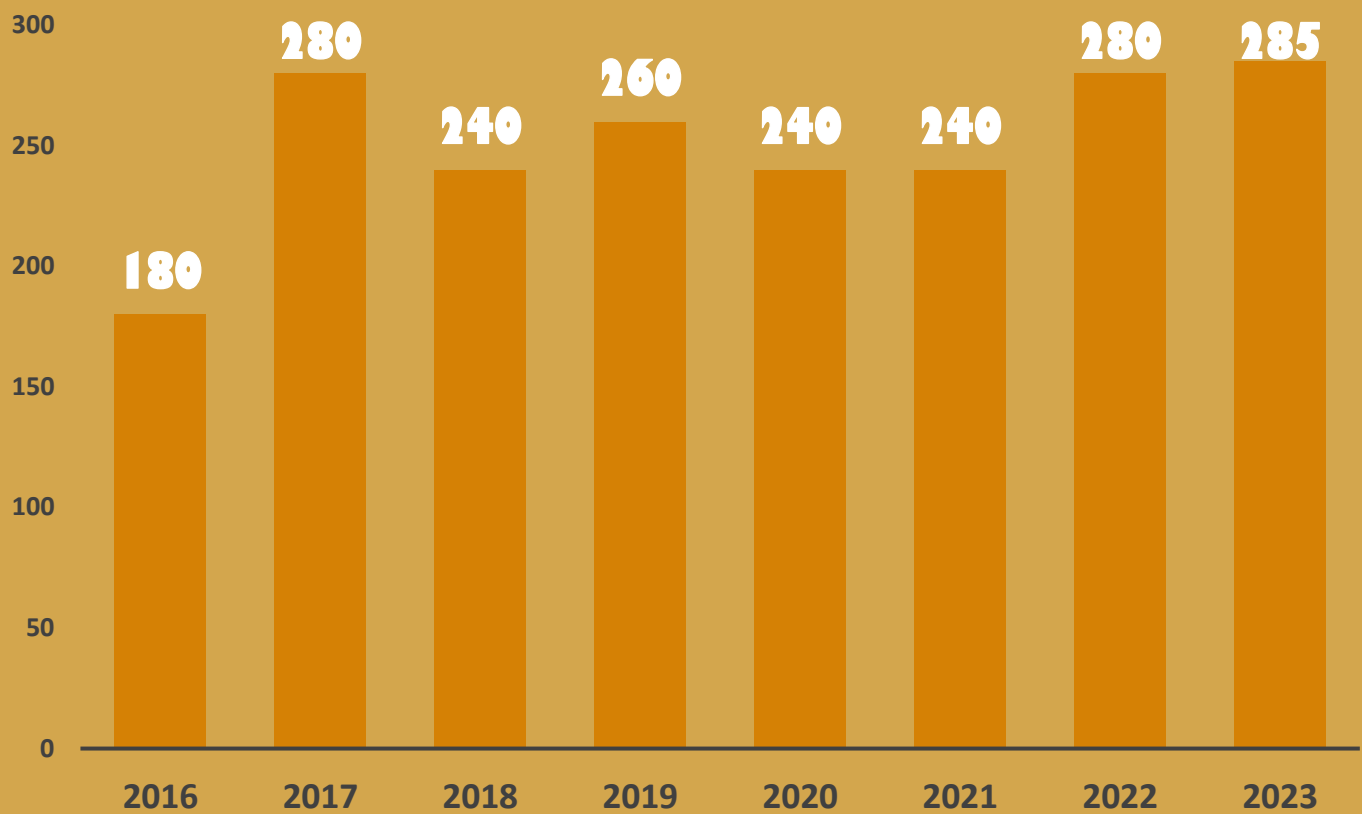
Majority of the children in this area go to school without breakfast because of poverty. As a result, this project has contributed to improved concentration and activeness of the pupils during class time, and in turn better academic performance in the long-term.

HSH Feeding Program gives kindergarteners an opportunity to stay concentrated in class without hunger. This is achieved through feeding the kindergarten school going children with nutritious porridge every morning-break at school. As a pilot project, it was started in Makongeni in 2016 and it is now on going. The project is hailed to be successful by the parents and teachers of Makongeni Pre-primary school. In 2021, we added second school to our program and now also kids from Gazi are served porridge.

In 2023 our HSH Feeding Program was running smoothly throughout the whole year. Our HSH Feeding Program cook Mauwa and our volunteers made sure porridge was served in every school day.

As important and massive development step, in the end of the year we started to construct a new kitchen to the primary school in Makongeni. The aim of the new HSH Feeding Program extension is to start serving porridge to the primary pupils by February 2024. This will mean around 1000 porridge cups in a day.

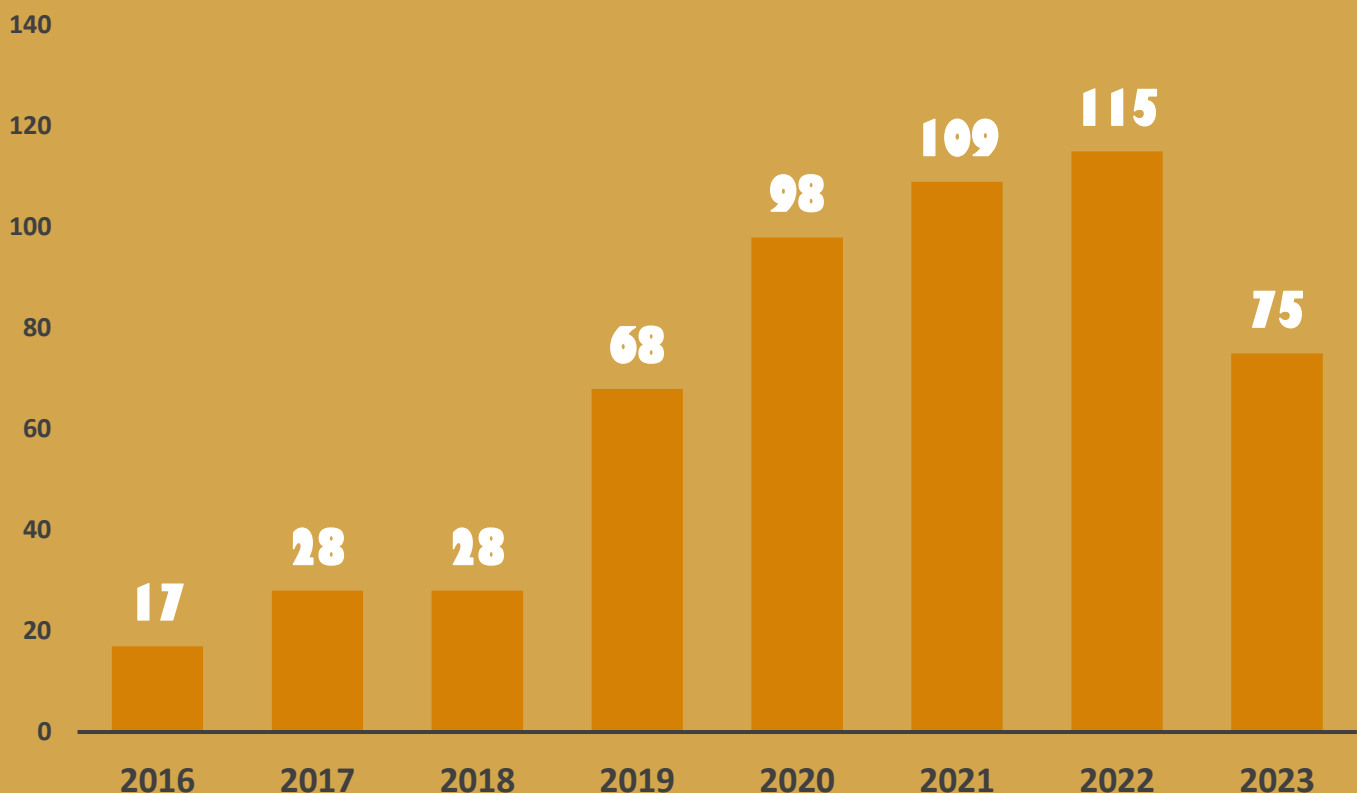

PART 3: HSH WORKSHOPS & TRAININGS



HSB BABYSHOWER

In Finland all expectant mothers are given a baby box. It's like a starter kit of clothes, sheets, toys, and other baby products. The box itself can be even used as a bed. It's tradition that dates to 1930s and it's designed to give all children in Finland, no matter what background they are from, an equal start in life.

In 2016 we wanted to bring our own baby boxes to mothers here in Kenya. As a result, we started our HSB Babyshower program. The aim of the program is to share well-designed baby basins, organize trainings and connect new mothers together.

During 2021 we developed HSB Babyshower as full and created a new babyshower workshop package. Our new workshops focused on nutrition, hygiene & skin care, vaccinations, baby's development milestones and child's first aid. In addition, we also discussed about the importance of regular clinic visits and birth certificate application process.

In 2023 we continued to run and redevelop the HSB Babyshower program. In March, we organized Babyshower event for 100 mothers. four groups of 25 mothers arrived to our center and participated our maternity workshops led by wonderful Clara. After the workshops, we shared baby basins to all participated mothers.



HSH BABYSHOWER WORKSHOP TRAINER: CLARA

Our wonderful HSH Babyshower trainer is Clara. Clara is lifeguard, first aider, county hospital maternity worker and mother of three. Clara understands the cultural and environmental context the mothers are living in. She understands how background, culture and religion affect the life of a mother and her child. She is also having a high knowledge about natal clinic services and general governmental services in the area.

She is simply the best person to lead the workshops and teach the mothers.

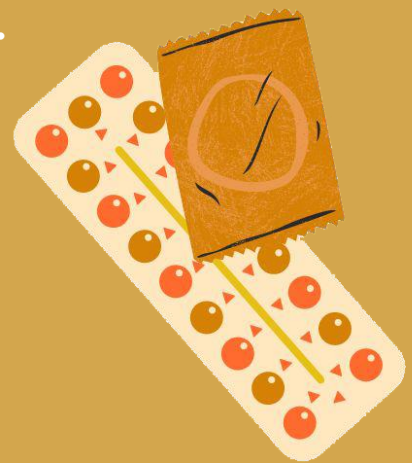

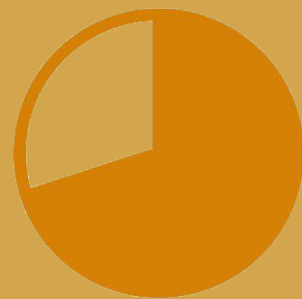

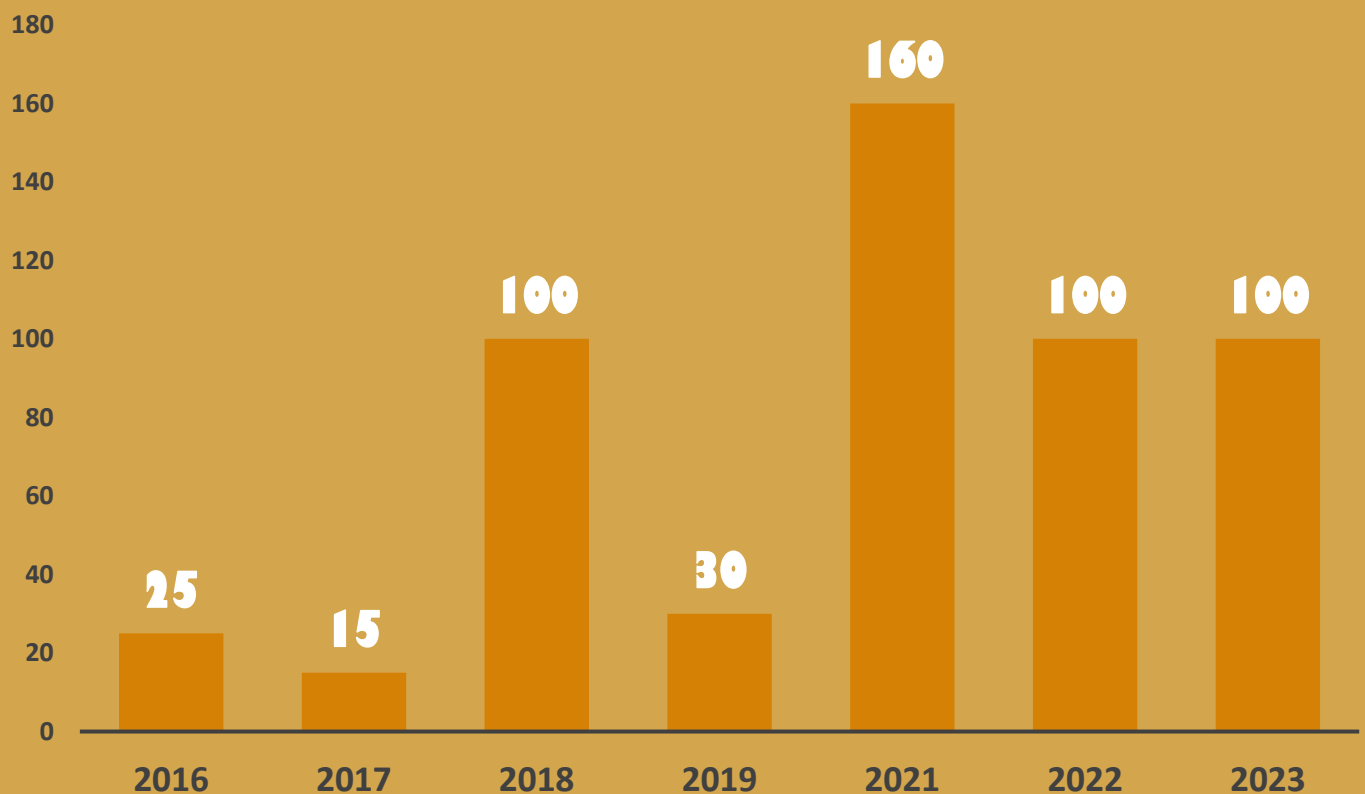

HSH GIRL'S & BOY'S CLASSES

The HSH Girl's & Boy's Class program aims to teach youths about sexual education. Our program aims to develop and strengthen the ability of children and young people to make conscious, satisfying, healthy, and respectful choices regarding relationships, sexuality, and emotional and physical health. The program is done in one full day session, that includes numerous topics.

The main topics of the HSH Girl's & Boy's Classes are sexual health and rights, but the class covers plenty of other related topics as well. Other topics that are also stressed include puberty, menstruation, menstruation hygiene, and different period products like reusable sanitary towels and menstruation cups. In addition, the program covers topics such as safe sex, different birth control methods, the risks of home abortion, and where to get help, if someone is pressuring you for sex.

This year we have organized our girl's & boy's class programs as part of our holiday program in November. The classes were organized on 10th and 17th of November and they were led by our clinical officer Cecilia. This time 40 girls and 20 boys attended the classes. After participating the program, the participants were asked to fill anonymous survey.

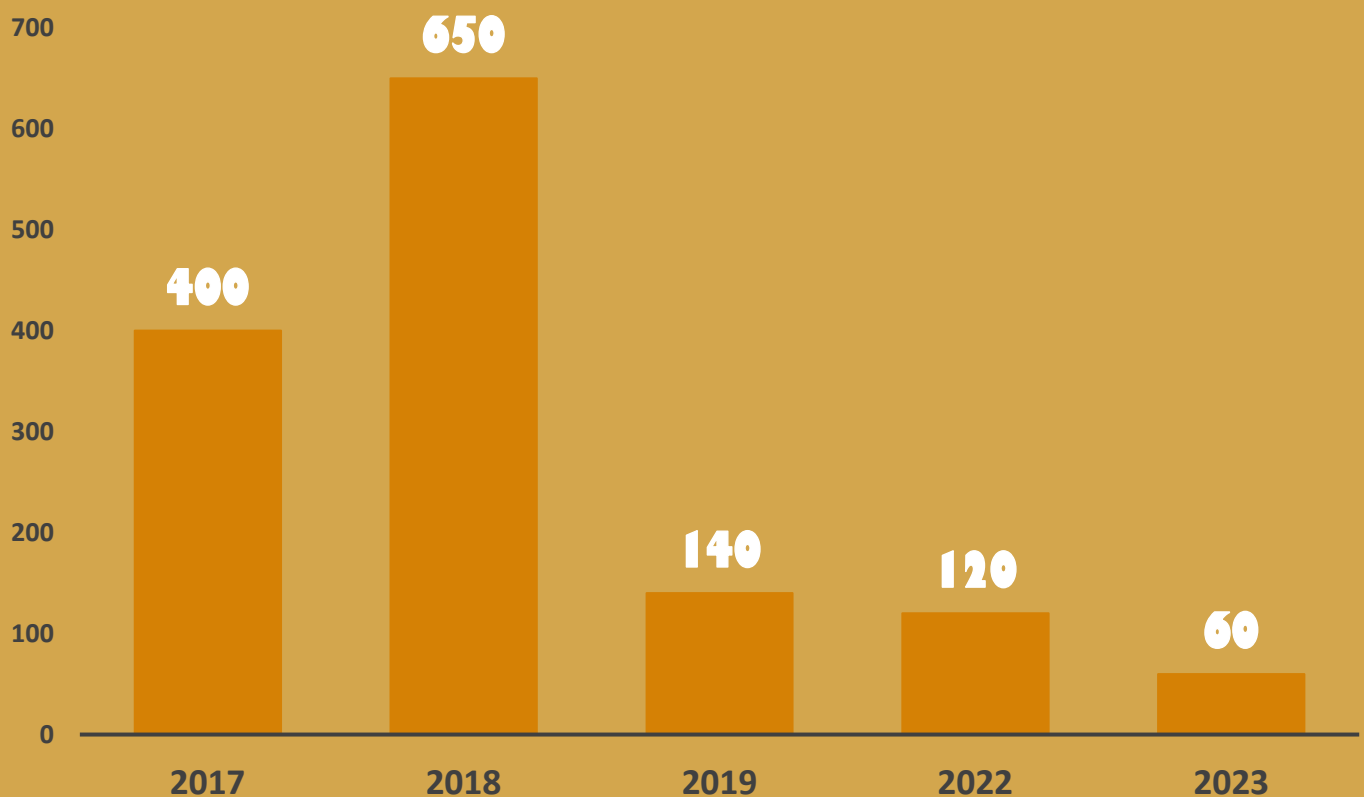



In his spare time, Beka likes to relax from all the hard work by watching a football match.

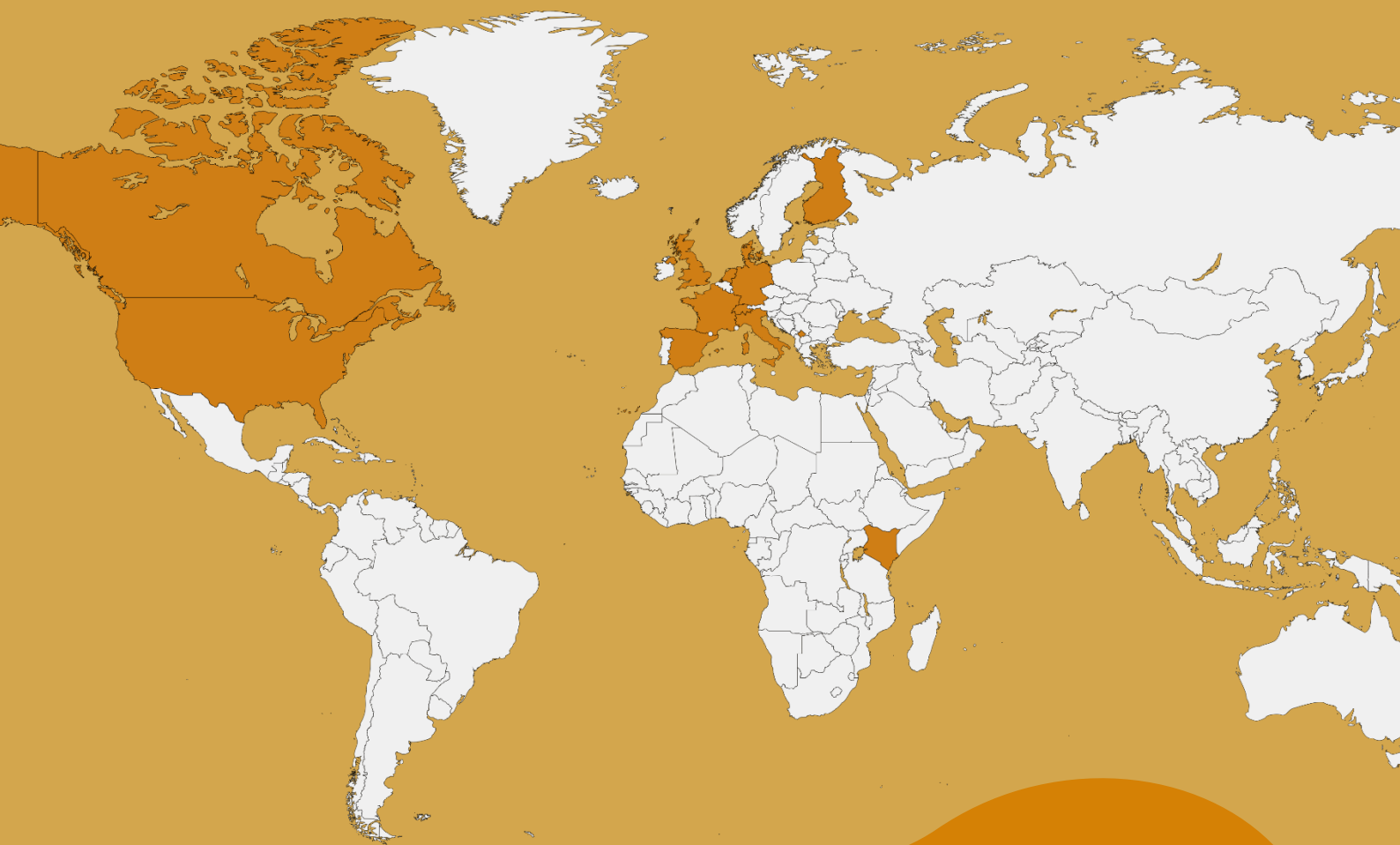

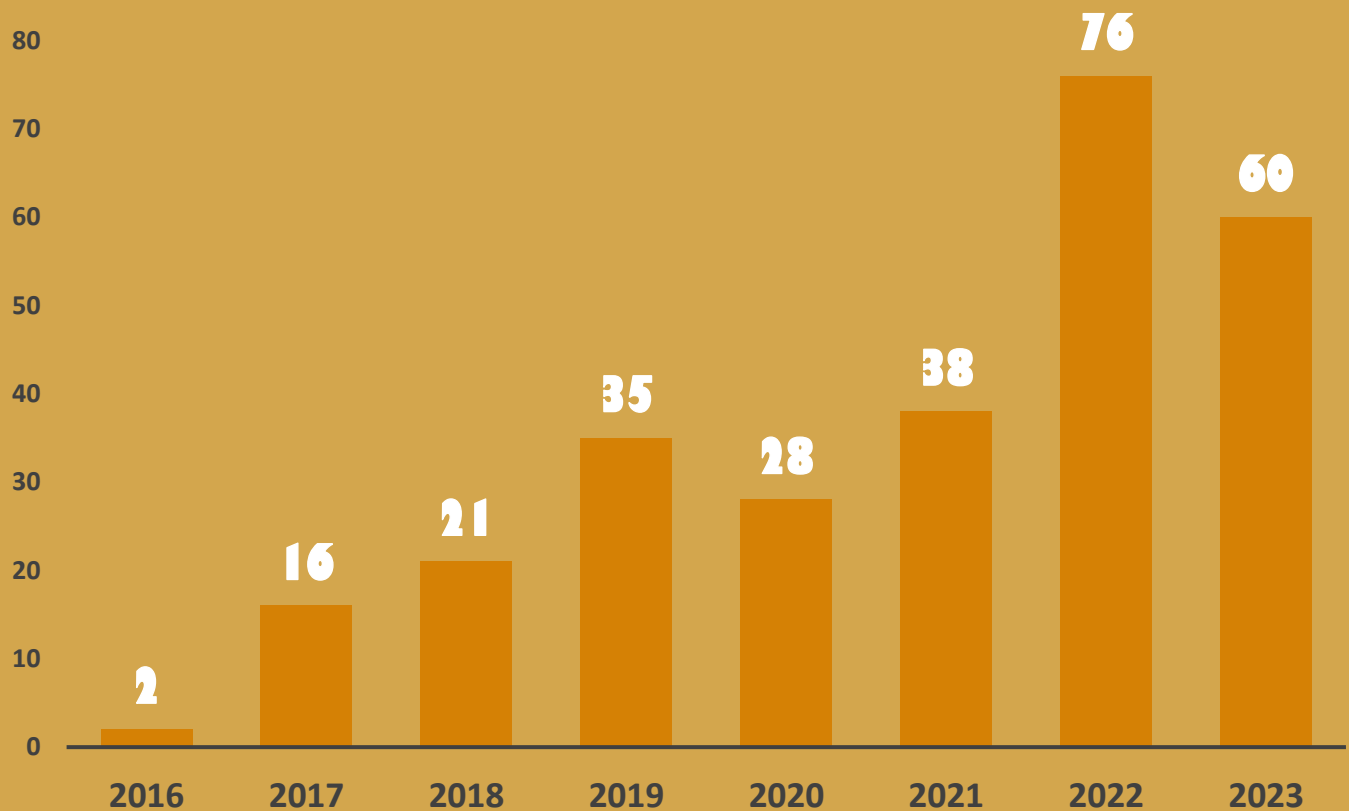

“When I graduated from high school in 2023, my dream from five years back to do volunteering in Home Street Home finally came true. At the end of the summer, I decided to contact Viola. I was amazed again and again how innovative people were and they always could find a solution. ABSTRACT OF THE THESIS

“The purpose of the thesis was to create clear and high-quality instructions for two point-of-care devices called HemoCue Hb 201+ and Alere Afinion as 100. The instructions were created specifically to be used at the clinic of the organization’s center. Point-of-care tests are utilized near the patient. Testing can be performed by health care professionals or patients and usually has a direct effect on the planning of a patient’s treatment. Performing these tests with good quality requires qualification and instructions. Quality assurance is also necessary in order to ensure the reliability of test results. Quality assurance usually involves utilizing internal and external quality assessments as well as making sure that possible errors are recognized. With proper arrangements and training, point-of-care tests can be considered as reliable as tests performed at clinical laboratories. In our thesis we used national and international recommendations for point-of-care testing and quality management in the process of creating the instructions. In addition to this we had to take into account the requests and expectations of the commissioner. To create the instructions, we used our self-generated images and the Microsoft PowerPoint tool. We also gathered feedback from the employees of the clinic about the practicality and overall appearance of the instructions. Our functional thesis resulted in two instruction manuals that were found to be linguistically and visually clear based on the feedback survey. The finished instructions were delivered to the commissioner as PDF files.”

1. Take a test kit and let it warm up in room temperature for 15 minutes before analysis (do not open the foil package)

2. Remove test cartridge from the package. Only touch the top part of test cartridge. Use disposable gloves.

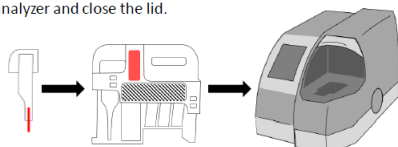
3. Prepare a capillary blood sample. Warm up patient’s hand. Choose a middle/ring finger. Choose a disposable fingertip with an alcohol wipe. Hold hand and make a puncture with a lancet gently for a droplet of blood. Dispose

4. Remove a sampling capillary from the cartridge. Fill the capillary with blood. **Make sure the capillary is full with no air bubbles.**

5. Place the test capillary back into the cartridge. Then place the cartridge into the Afinion analyzer and close the lid.

6. Test result will appear on the touch screen in about 4 minutes. Result <5mg/l indicates CRP level is not high.

7. Dispose all parts of a used cartridges. **Keep the analyzer lid closed when not used.**

Important to notice:

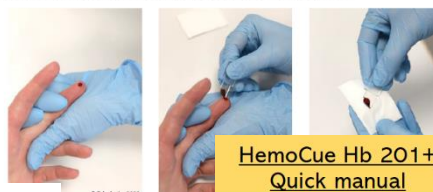
*Analyze Afinion CRP control samples regularly.

*Do not use broken/old/used test kits.

*Keep test cartridges in even temperature. If stored in room temperature (12- 25°C) kits remain usable for **4 weeks**.

*Always consider patient’s clinical condition. If a test result seems suspicious, consider testing again. **Analyse a control sample first to make sure the analyser is working correctly.**

4. Gently apply pressure on the fingertip until drop of blood is large enough. Fill the microcuvette completely at one time. The microcuvette must not be refilled. Use lint-free wipe to wipe off excess blood from the outside of the microcuvette.

1. Alcohol swab
2. Lint-free wipe
3. Lancet (selected according to the age of the patient)
4. Adhesive plaster
5. HemoCue microcuvette (must be used within three minutes after removal from the package. Always keep a vial tightly closed)

2. Press and hold the left button to start the analyser. Analyser performs self-test automatically.




3. Open the cuvette holder. When three flashing dashes and the HemoCue symbol appears, analyser is ready to use.



4. Make sure the patient's hand is warm. Take the sample from side of the fingertip. Use middle or ring finger.

Clean the fingertip with alcohol swab and let dry. Gently squeeze the finger using the thumb so that a little pressure is applied to the end of the finger.

Use the lancet to puncture finger. Wipe off first three drops of blood.

HSH FOOTBALL TOURNAMENT

Every year, we have organized a special event during Christmas time. The aim has been to do good and reach out to people who are not actively involved in Home Street Home's projects. In previous years, we have distributed food and hygiene items. This year we decided to organize a new kind of event and support local youth sports.

Many young people in the village play or follow football. They are fans of world-class football stars and follow the games feverishly. They watch world games on TV in the village theatre and cheer on their home teams on the village pitch. On the football pitch, young people are on an equal footing. People from different ethnic groups are included and playing does not require wealth. Everyone can play.

In early December, we organized a two-day HSH Football Tournament for under-18s. During the tournament, 4 boys' teams and 4 girls' teams from the surrounding villages competed against each other for the championship.

In addition to the 200 players, a large number of villagers came to watch the tournament. We organized official referees, a first aid post, a kiosk, lunch, and drinking water for the players.

The idea of the tournament was to bring young people together and promote a sense of community. We want to play our part in encouraging young people to lead healthy lifestyles. Village football clubs have a very strict no-drinking rule. Football therefore has a positive impact on the substance abuse problems in the area. In addition, girls' football also has a significant gender equality impact.

This time, the tournament was won by the Waizata boys and the Makongeni girls. All participating teams received a first aid kit as a prize. The finalists also received uniforms and captain's ribbons. The winning teams also received trophies and balls.

The tournament was a warm-hearted affair. Football unites the village community and brings the whole village together. This is reflected in the public participation and the fact that when a goal is scored, the crowd runs onto the pitch to cheer. Throughout the tournament, football fans of all ages could be found on the sidelines of the pitch, watching the games with excitement.

COLLABORATIONS WITH COMPANIES, ORGANIZATIONS, OR GROUPS

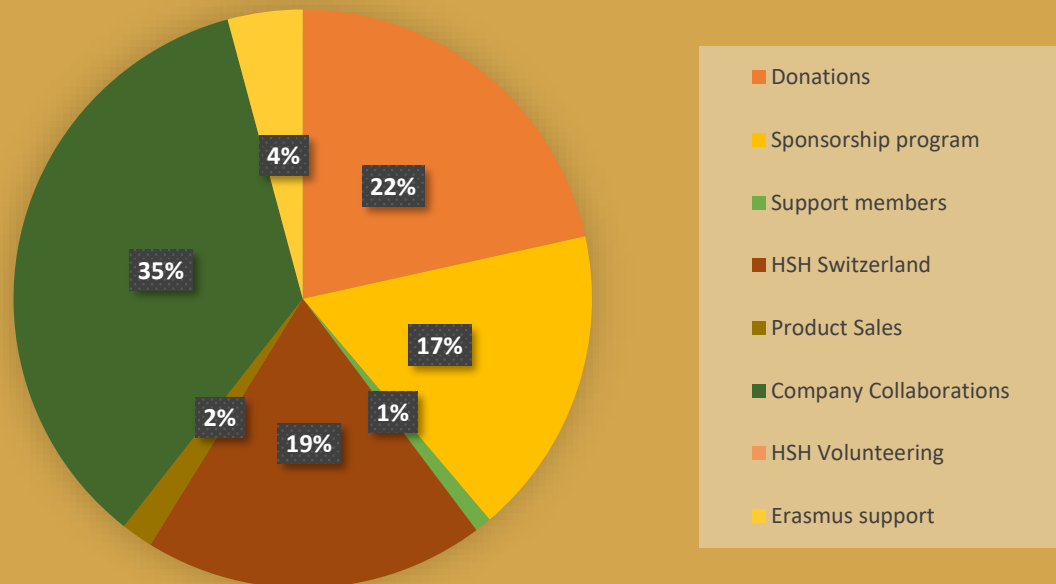

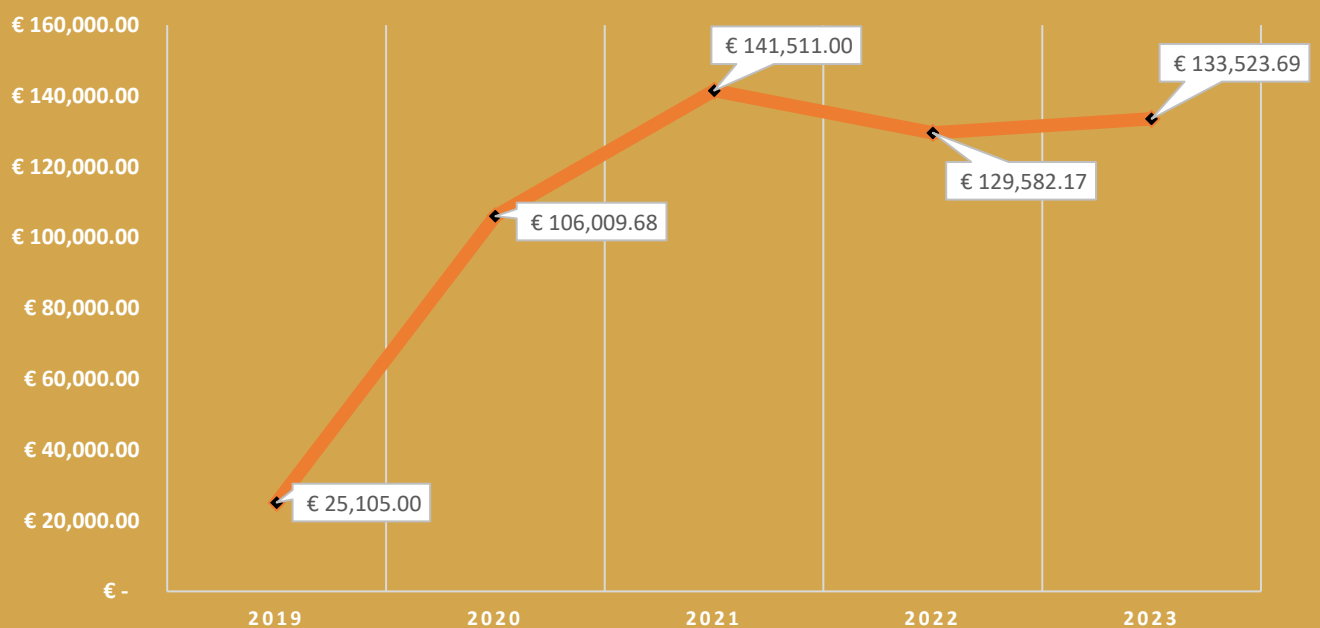

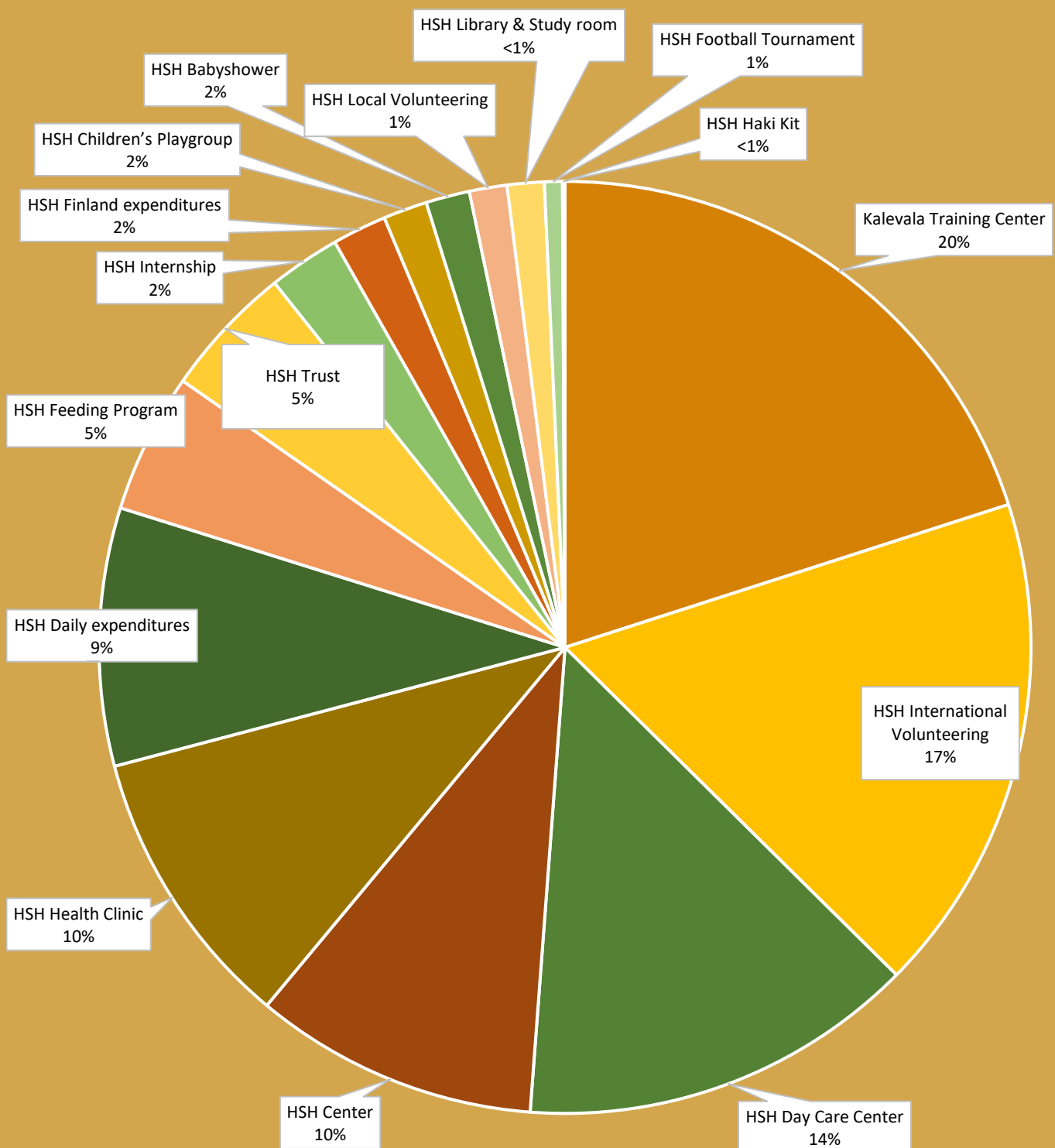
All the payment sheets and vouchers were signed by the people who received the payments and confirmed through HSH board members.
